### ENGINEER'S OPINION

Gowganda Endorsed By Mexican

In The Engineering and Mining Journal of May 1, there is an article of nterest by H. E. West of El Oro, Mexat Gow Ganda, he says: "My expernce of Gow Ganda up to March of his year has been confined entirely o the southern half, and from Gow Ganda to Elk Horn Lakes. As this ea, about two miles square, comit will be a guide in estimating the probabilities of this new mining camp as a future producer of silver. "In the four southern blocks of the Bartlett Mines exist some excellent surface showings of native silver. I remember one particularly that I saw in December last that was exposed for about 50 feet. In places the vein was 12 inches between the diabase walls, the silver streak averaging from one to two inches in width, carrying probably 3000 to 6000 ounces per ton of ore, the balance of the vein containing leaf silver. The walls contained leaf silver for a few inches, or possibly a foot, from the silver streak.

"To the west the vein was seen cutting through the polished glaciated surface of the diabase bluff. These two veins were joined by a vein in the diabase about 1-8 of an inch wide and filled with sheets of silver. The appearance was striking and up to the present the most promising exposure I have seen in Gow Ganda."


