

New Lacrosse Rules Proposed for C.L.A. Notes of the Game

The time for accepting amendments to the constitution, regulations and rules of the Canadian Lacrosse Association expires on Wednesday. The following are already proposed:

By J. J. Kelly, Brantford.—To amend article 1, sec. 5, page 14, to read: "Every player in the junior and juvenile series must file with the secretary of the association a certificate of birth from the registrar-general's department of Ontario, at Toronto, before the secretary can issue a playing certificate to him or his club."

By Ernie Knott, Toronto.—To strike out section 4, article 1, regulations, page 14. To amend sec. 3 by striking out the word "other" after all, and adding the word "senior" before the word "regulate". This section would then be sec. 2 of article 3, page 14.

By O. S. Eby, Hoopster.—Add words "and yellow" paper for "juvenile" words in the junior series in article 1 of regulations. Strike out all of sec. 5, article 2, after the words "time of match" in the second line and add "in all final matches the association shall be paid 15 per cent. of the gross gate receipts, the remaining 85 per cent. to be divided equally between the two competing clubs after the railway and hotel expenses for the two teams of 14 men and the necessary expense of the match are defrayed. In case the amount is not sufficient to cover such expenses, it shall be divided between the competing clubs in proportion to the amount of expense incurred."

To amend rule 2, so as to make it read: "The ball shall be made of good quality solid white rubber of regular size, as follows: circumference 8 inches, diameter 3 inches and must be furnished by the home club."

To cut out paragraph relating to juvenile series on pages 10 and 11, and substitute same in same paragraphs as govern other series of the association.

By J. K. Forey, Toronto.—Strike out words "intermediate and junior" in what is now sec. 1 of art. 3, and substitute word "all" so as to make it read "all clubs."

Strike out sec. 1 of article 4, and amend it so as to read: "The club winning the Globe Trophy Shield shall, before receiving it, give to the secretary-treasurer for the home club a bond of \$50, and for the Maple Leaf Shield a bond of \$25."

To add the word "treasurer" after the word "secretary" in sec. 2 of art. 4, and to substitute "to" for "in" in the words "the secretary" following "in each year" in the same section, also to strike out the words "only the president of the association who will" and "the president notifies the secretary that" in the same section.

To sec. 2 of art. 4, so as to make it read: "The home team shall pay the referee the sum of \$5 and his actual hotel and traveling expenses." Page 20.

To amend sec. 1 of rule 4, so as to make it read: "The twelve players in each side shall be designated as follows: 'Goalkeeper,' 'point,' 'cover-point,' 'first defence,' 'second defence,' 'third defence,' 'centre,' 'third home,' 'second home,' 'first home,' 'outside home,' 'inside home.'"

To add to sec. 6 of art. 6 the following: "No change shall be made in the starting time of a game, unless both teams interested agree, in which case they shall notify the secretary of the association of the hour fixed by such mutual agreement at least three days before the game."

To cut out the words following and including "in cases of championship games, etc." in sec. 7 of rule 5.

By B. McGuire, Orangeville.—Amend section 7 of present art. 3, by making team 14 men instead of 12, and the words "at half-time" instead of "the end of the match."

To add to all that portion of sec. 2, art. 2, following words "money to be paid at advertised time of match," which in itself shall be changed to read "money to be paid at half-time."

To add to sec. 5 of art. 5, by striking out the words "any player who has played on a senior team since the season of 1904, shall not be eligible to play on a junior team"; also the words "Junior, intermediate team" in the last two lines, substituting therefor the words "any series of the association." Page 19.

To amend sec. 6 of art. 6, so as to make it read: "In the event of either club delaying the commencement of the game for more than 30 minutes they shall be fined \$5 and the same paid to the secretary of the association." Page 21.

Mr. William Foran now states that he does not intend to re-enter lacrosse as an active officer of the Capital Club. Dr. J. L. Chabot intended to retire from the presidency, but has done such good work in the position that his fellow-officers are endeavoring to have him continue. Dr. Chabot may be prevailed upon to act once more, the honor, as understood, to go along, being open to him should he consent to take over the duties for another term.

The Value of Dick Croker's Orby.

PALM BEACH, Fla., March 12.—That Mr. Richard Croker had recently retained \$100,000 for Orby, his Derby winner, now in stud at Glencairn, Ireland, became known when he was asked today by a reporter a cable report stating that a large offer had been made for the horse. The offer came from the Italian Government and was refused promptly. When Mr. Croker was asked why he looked up quickly, as if surprised. "The cause," said he, "it was no price for him. As a business proposition he is worth twice that; but, then, I wouldn't sell him for any amount. No, sir, nothing would tempt me to dispose of him, the I guess if I wanted to I could get \$200,000 to-morrow." Mr. Croker was reticent about other offers he had received for Orby. "The horse is good for twenty-five years yet," said he, "and in the year he has been in service he has earned \$10,000 for me. An Orby colt from a good mare is worth \$50,000 to-day. I have five already. If Orby's service will double immediately, and if he should have a foal winning the Derby I feel confident they would be worth \$25,000 a season. That's the interest on half a million, you know, and so you see I don't think a hundred thousand any price at all. One horse like Orby pays for all my stables."
