CANADIAN PEACHES NOW ON MARKET

First of Season Arrived on the Wholesale Yesterday.

BIG WASTE IN FRUIT

The Prices Varied Materially According to the Condition.

The first Canadian peaches for this season arrived on the market yesterday from H. C. Bradley, Queenston, to McWilliam & Everist.

Most of the fruits which came in yesterday showed a large percentage of waste; causing prices to vary materially, according to the condition they were in. Red currants were especially soft and sold at 7c to 11c per box.

Raspberries also deteriorated, some of them being so badly shaken up they were in small parties; the prices ranging from 10c to 20c per box.

Cherries remained about stationary the 11-quart baskets of sour ones selling at 40c to 70c and 4-quart at 27 1/2c to 40c; the sweet cherries selling at from 60c to \$1.10 and 11-quart at \$1.25 to \$2.00.

Blueberries were especially soft and sold at 7c to 11c per box. The bulk of the gooseberries are also small fruit, selling around 40c per 11-quart basket, some choice large ones going at 70c.

Blueberries still varied greatly in price according to the pack and quality, selling at \$1.25, \$1.10 and a very few at \$2 per 11-quart.

Tomatoes were shipped in very heavily, and were a slow sale for a few days, and to \$1.50 for No. 1's and \$1.25 for No. 2's.

Green peas were firm, selling at 75c to \$1 per 11-quart. The small ones of inferior brand being difficult to dispose of at 50c and 40c.

Green corn was gradually increasing in quantity, selling at 40c to 50c per 6-quart and 75c to \$1 per 11-quart.

New potatoes again declined, selling at \$2.50 to \$3.75 per bushel. Lemons have advanced—due no doubt to the extreme hot weather creating a demand for them. They now sell at \$5.50 to \$6 per case.

Samuel Hisey had a car of new potatoes, selling at \$2.75 per bushel. Stronach & Sons had a car of new potatoes, selling at \$2.75 per bushel; a car of watermelons, selling at 40c to 75c each.

Chas. Simpson had a car of cantaloupes, selling at \$4 per case. McWilliam & Everist had a car of new potatoes, selling at \$2.50 per bushel; a car of bananas & a car of tomatoes, selling at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per case; a car of California peaches at \$3 to \$4 per case.

FURTHER ADVANCE

MADE BY ITALIANS

Infantry Resumes Drive on Northern Slopes of Pasubio.

ENEMY ATTACKS FAIL

Austrian Attempts to Check Progress in Posina Valley Are Fruitless.

ROME, July 18.—In the face of vigorous opposition the Italians are making further advances, the war office announced today in the following statement: "The enemy on our positions at Foppiano."

"Notwithstanding vigorous resistance on the part of the enemy, our infantry has resumed the advance on the northern slopes of the Pasubio. Lively fighting continues in the Posina Valley and in the Atesia area, where the enemy attempted to check our progress by repeated but fruitless counter-attacks. Small encounters took place near Mesole, in the Sugana Valley, resulting in our favor. The enemy shelled villages, causing fires in a villa south of Strigolo. Along the remainder of the front there were artillery and mortar attacks. Small encounters took place in the upper Fella Valley."

"Hostile aircraft dropped bombs on Ospedello without causing any damage. Our aircraft bombarded the railway station at Andrea, south of Gortina."

PRUSSIAN GUARDS LOST SEVERELY AT OVILLERS

Few Survivors of Two Regiments Taken Prisoner by British.

MAGNANIMITY SHOWN

British Presented Defenders With Their Arms in Recognition of Bravery.

PARIS, July 18.—The capture of Ovillers by the British necessitated one of the most sanguinary encounters of the advance, wires a correspondent of The Liberator. Nevertheless, the British were well rewarded for their effort, they gained possession of the broad highway leading from Albert to Bapaume. The village was defended for ten days by two regiments of the Prussian Guard. The correspondent says that of these regiments only 126 men survived, all of them having been captured.

Some of the Germans are reported to have been poisoned by drinking polluted water from a pond, and others to have been driven mad by the bombardment. When the survivors left the village as prisoners, the British presented them their arms in recognition of the bravery of these defenders.

It was at Ovillers that the British offensive which began July 1 was held up while the remainder of the line was advancing. From July 7 on Ovillers was cut off almost completely from the German rear, but it was not until July 14 that the desperate resistance of the Prussian Guard was overcome.

The defenders of the town suffered hunger and thirst as the British cut off the food and water supplies of fresh supplies.

URGES FRENCH TROOPS TO GREATER EXERTION

General Nivelle, Commander at Verdun, Delivers Inspiring Message.

TO BE NO YIELDING

Foe's Savage Onslaughts to Be Withstood at All Costs.

PARIS, July 18.—In an army order in which he communicated to his troops a congratulatory address sent them by the French Academy, Gen. Robert George Nivelle, commander of the French forces at Verdun, says: "Thanks to the heroic stand of the French before Verdun, the desperate struggle already has made brilliant progress and the Germans are not at Verdun."

"Our work is not finished. No Frenchman has a right to a moment's rest while the enemy remains on the ground. To enable the allies offensive to develop freely and culminate in a rapid decisive victory we will continue to withstand the assaults of our implacable enemies, who, notwithstanding the sacrifices of half a million men, which Verdun has already cost them, still cling to their main hopes."

"Not satisfied with resisting, soldiers of the second army, you will constantly harass the adversary as he is held before you, by ceaseless menace, the greatest possible part of the enemy forces until the approaching hour of the general offensive."
