They Agree That Country Should Have Union Government.

We, as the Labor party do nct intend press or pub-lic to iopugn the loyaity which the Labor parity has always exhibited and always will exhibit. Union govern-ment? Yes. We will stand for Union govern-ment; we will always support Union government; but we will not stand for the personnel of the present Union gov-ernment."




