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THREE IMPORTANT PHASES TO THE IRISH REVOLUTION

Sinn Fein, Bolshevik Labor and Extreme Red Agrarian Parties, Backed By European Money, Are Each Working for the Overthrow of British Rule.

The following statement concerning Ireland is not published here as an argument on the Irish question. It is from a memorandum issued by southern loyalists (i.e., anti-Sinn Fein), and presented to Bonar Law.

There is, therefore, no question of its being non-partisan, since it was issued by one party in order to bring certain facts to the attention of the government. However, the truth or falsehood of the statements made is not to be judged by this, and since the description of conditions is entirely new to the American press, we are giving the matter a publicity which is due to it.

The revolutionary movement in Ireland is usually described as Sinn Fein, a convenient term which is, nevertheless, unfortunate, because it is misleading.

Sinn Fein was in its origin and regarded by itself as a political party, aiming at an Irish republic, but while Sinn Fein was in process of development, there was growing a revolutionary labor party, which aimed at an Irish workers' republic.

The political and economic aims of the labor party may be judged from the following quotation from the statement presented by it to the Senate last week: "The independence of Ireland is not a mere political question, it is a social question, and its solution depends on the economic reconstruction of the country."

The insuperable obstacle to the unity of the Irish workers and the working class, presented by the political, economic and national question, is the Irish people to a foreign power. Since the independence of Ireland is a social question, and the settlement of the issue between a subject people and an imperialist power, an essential part of the union of the Irish workers in a class-conscious movement for the liberation of the workers of political, power, liberty, land and all resources, and

the ownership and control of Ireland, and everything in Ireland.

While Sinn Fein has prosecuted the military campaign for independence, and the work of spectacular propaganda, the labor wing of the revolutionary movement has been in relations with labor extremists in Great Britain. The latter, in fact, was a movement designed to provoke "responsive action" in Great Britain, and failed, as Mr. Johnson, its parent, has become aware, such action was not forthcoming. The labor party is now adopting the policy of direct action to support Sinn Fein.

During the last few months, a third revolutionary movement has appeared, this time agrarian. It is extremely hard to analyze this movement with any accuracy.

The one discernible basis of this agrarian movement appears to be the denial of any right of ownership. It presents features reminiscent of the land policy of Russian Bolshevism.

It is, of course, the fact that the revolutionary movements in Ireland are not infrequently clash. Agrarianists suffer from the operations of the labor party, and the agrarian party is suffering from the operations of the labor party, and the agrarian party is suffering from the operations of the labor party.

We have three tripartite revolutionary movements in Ireland, each of which has different inspirations and methods, but which co-operate for the common purpose of opposing and destroying the British connection. It is further to be observed that each of these movements shows marked differentiations from their predecessors in Ireland. Even Sinn Fein, the political movement, differs in important respects from those of the past. The labor movement is entirely new, and the agrarian movement is no longer directed against excessive rents or uncertainty of tenure.

This, we believe, is due very largely to foreign influences reinforced by foreign money. Ireland has always shown herself susceptible to continental influences, and is equally, if not more susceptible to them today. We are inclined to regard this as a cardinal factor in the situation and one which demands the special attention of the government.

The government, therefore, have to deal with three revolutionary movements working more or less in unison. 1. Political, operating by quasi-military methods, including assassination and destruction of government property. 2. Industrial, operating by strikes. 3. Agrarian, partly organized, partly spontaneous, and by a definite purpose, partly the outcome of individual caprice of private animosity.

WHOLESALE FRUITS AND VEGETABLES CANNOT DICTATE PRICE OF WHEAT

Canadian Farmers Better Off Without Government Control, is Argument.

New York, August 2.—(By Canadian Press). The Wall Street Journal today says: "Western Canadian farmers, in common with other farmers, will think it over and sensibly conclude that they are better off without than with government wheat control."

Receipts of domestic products were extremely light yesterday, owing to the holiday, consisting of tomatoes, blueberries, cucumbers and corn.
