BRAINS DO NOT COMMAND AS HIGH WAGES AS BROWN

American Writer Deals With the Question of Teachers' Wages—The Average Laid Carrier Earns Much More Than the Teacher, Who Must Live Better and Work Harder, After an Expensive Preparation for His Work.

(William B. Curtis, in the Chicago Record-Examiner.) Several people have written to question me, concerning the comparison between wages paid to teachers of the public schools and the wages paid to manual labor. It is a little more into detail and show, by the figures, how much better manual labor is paid than intellectual labor, and how much greater advantages are afforded to the latter.
