Chair, and the following Gentlemen were named as a Committee of Management: THE RECORDER, JUDGE CHAPMAN, THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL, THE HON. SHERIFF, CAPTAIN OTTY, R. N., MR. HARRIS, DR. BOYD.

The spacious and commodious room at the Masonic Hall was immediately engaged, and preparations were entered upon with the utmost spirit and activity.

An express was sent to Frederickton, to request from Lieut. Col. CARROLL, the attendance of the Band of the 81st Regiment, who, in the most obliging manner, acceded to this request, and sent down the Band in the Steam-Bark on Thursday.

Invitations were also sent to the Officers of the 81st, at Frederickton, and to all the Officers in Garrison, and in the Military Departments, and to all ladies and gentlemen, strangers in town.

The weather, which had been dull and gloomy, cleared up in the course of Friday, and the evening proved most propitious. His Excellency, and Lady Douglas and Family, arrived at the Masonic Hall, a little after nine, and were received by the Gentlemen of the Committee.

A party of the City Militia Artillery, having, in the most spirited manner, volunteered their attendance in King's Square, announced the arrival of the distinguished guests by a salute. Lady Douglas and her Daughters, were conducted to an elevated seat under a canopy, erected for the purpose, in a central situation on the north side of the Ball Room.

The Supper Room, as well as the Ball Room, had been decorated with great taste and effect, under the direction of the Gentlemen of the Committee. The coup d'oeil of the Supper Room, in an especial manner, was most brilliant and imposing.

The Supper had been prepared by Mr. SCARWELL, the best Wines flowed in abundance, and Sparkling Champagne circulated all its enlivening influence.

After Supper, the Recorder, who occupied the Chair as President, first proposed the health of the KING as present know how to honour.

The health of His Majesty. This toast was drunk with the utmost enthusiasm. The party of Artillery on King's Square most appropriately and respectfully accompanying it with a royal salute, the Band playing "God save the King."

The Recorder then rose to propose the health of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor; and in doing so, expressed himself to the following effect: "I have now the honor of proposing to you a Toast which we have often drunk, and I hope we may long continue to drink, with the enthusiasm it deserves."

"The health of our distinguished Guest, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor. It is a pleasure to me to propose to you a Toast which we have often drunk, and I hope we may long continue to drink, with the enthusiasm it deserves."

"When I say that the high expectations we had formed when four years ago welcomed His Excellency to our shores have been fully realized, I feel I am expressing, in very inadequate terms, the sense which the community entertain of the benefits derived to the Province from His Excellency's administration."

"We shall probably ere long have to regret His Excellency's departure from us for a time, though, when we consider the occasion which calls him away, it is a high gratification to feel that it is an absence which will not, however, be, if possible, until His Excellency more closely to this Province."

"We cannot but view it as another distinguished mark of the paternal solicitude with which our Most Gracious Sovereign watches over the interests of this part of his dominions, when we see that a matter which concerns us so much, is entrusted to one on whose seal and talent we place the fullest reliance."

The health of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor. This toast was received with a burst of applause from the whole Company, the cheering continued for some minutes. His Excellency then rose and addressed the Company nearly in the following manner: "MR. RECORDER AND GENTLEMEN: I am very sensible of the gratifying terms in which you have done me the honor to propose my name, and deeply so, for the manner in which it has been received."

"If this were for me, too, a parting occasion, I should endeavour to express more fully my acknowledgments for the manner in which you have made reference to my commercial career, and characterized my administration as a residence amongst you. But our connection is not yet at an end, and I feel that I have yet much to accomplish for your benefit before I can consider myself entitled to all that you are pleased to say."

"With respect to the immediate object of my approaching absence from New-Brunswick, I rejoice that her interests in that momentous question, do not solely depend upon me, and that I shall have associated with me a high degree of native talent, integrity, local knowledge, and experience of the question, to aid in discharging the duties of this important mission. Whilst so employed, I shall be thankful to improve, for your advantage, all opportunities that may offer to promote the other interests of the Province; and should the question, which is about to take me from you, be brought to a successful termination, there is not a station which His Majesty can assign me that would be so agreeable to me, as to return to New-Brunswick, to preserve the British standard on the territory which we claim."

This address made a forcible and marked impression. When His Excellency sat down, the Band played His Excellency's March, as a tune appropriate to the occasion.

The Recorder again rose to propose the health of Lady Douglas and Family in the following manner: "LADIES AND GENTLEMEN: I have one more toast to propose, in which I am sure you will most heartily join. The health of Lady DOUGLAS and her Ladyship's Family, who have condescended to honor us, this night, with their company. We cannot, without regret, view their departure from the Province; though alleviated by the hope that their absence is only temporary. I feel entirely unable to express, in proper terms, the admiration with which this community have viewed the exemplary manner in which her Ladyship has discharged all the duties of her high station, and of private and social life. We are all deeply sensible of the uniform endeavor of her Ladyship and Family to promote the harmony and welfare of this society, and earnestly pray for their health and happiness."

While we most fervently wish to her Ladyship and Family a prosperous passage, and joyful meeting with their friends on the other side of the Atlantic, may I be allowed to express the hope we all so fondly cherish of again hearing, ere long, their return to us."

The Health of Lady Douglas and Family. This toast was received with great enthusiasm from the ladies. The feelings of her Ladyship were deeply moved, and Sir HOWARD, also under the evident influence of strong emotion, again rose and expressed himself nearly as follows: "If the occasion were such as only to raise feelings of an agreeable nature in those to whom these attentions have been addressed, Lady DOUGLAS would still feel much difficulty in expressing to so large an assemblage as this, the sense which she and her daughters entertain, for the honor you have done them. But unkind as this parting occasion is, by their unforgotten regard to the separation, which is about to take place, Lady DOUGLAS would be utterly unable to express her own feelings, and it devolves upon me to present to you her acknowledgments. In attempting this, I have only to fear, that I shall do justice to the terms in which Lady DOUGLAS would desire that I should make her reply. There is, indeed, sufficient evidence near me to show, that I cannot too strongly express the attachment of these Ladies to New-Brunswick—the pain they experience on leaving it—the sincere regard which they entertain for the societies in which they have had the happiness to live amongst you—the deep interest they will ever feel in all that concerns New-Brunswick, and their ardent wishes for your prosperity and happiness. Identified with them in all these sentiments and feelings, and grateful to you for the regard which you have expressed towards those so dear to me, I have so far felt with, and spoken for, those who are now receiving your farewell offerings. But circumstances, now bid me separate myself from them; and remaining with you, I am included amongst those who express their fervent wishes, that these members of my family may have

a pleasant and prosperous voyage to their native land, and a happy reunion with their friends." The Band then played "Adieu Long Spire" after which the distinguished Guests rose and returned with the Ladies to resume the dance in the Ball Room. They retired about two o'clock, having expressed themselves most highly gratified with the entertainment.—Courier.

Lady DOUGLAS and the female part of her family, embarked on board the Ship Allan Gilmour, this day at 12 o'clock, from the Custom-house Quay, in presence of a very respectable assemblage of the leading characters in the City, both Civil and Military, and under a salute of 15 guns from the City and County Militia.

Her Ladyship was evidently much affected, and took leave of those who had been honored with her acquaintance, in the most kind and condescending manner. His Excellency and the Misses DOUGLAS, were also under the influence of strong emotion. The whole scene was solemn and imposing in a high degree. The weather was extremely propitious, the wind, though not strong, was favourable, and the beautiful vessel, with her interesting and distinguished passengers, left our shores in fine style, shortly after the embarkation took place. Her Ladyship and amiable daughters, have thus taken their departure in most auspicious circumstances, and sure we are they carry with them the best wishes of this whole community, for a safe and propitious voyage across the mighty deep, and a happy meeting with their friends in the land of their nativity.—They are accompanied by Lieut.-Col. DRURY, and Mr. ALLAN, of the Medical Staff; the guardianship of the former, and the professional services of the latter, having been secured by His Excellency in his considerate attention to the welfare of those so justly dear to him.

It is now confidently stated, and we believe upon good authority, that Sir PEREGRINE MAITLAND is to be the new Lieutenant-Governor of Nova-Scotia, and that Sir J. COLBURN, Colonel of the 52d Regiment, is to have the Government of Upper Canada. In consequence of this arrangement, and the expected early arrival of Sir PEREGRINE at Halifax, His Excellency Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS will not visit Nova-Scotia this season, as once intended.—It is also rumored that the King of the Netherlands is to be the Empire between Great-Britain and the United States, in the matter of the Boundary-Line.

The present is a period remarkable in our Colonial annals for the number of partings between Governors and people, and as the natural consequence, our prints teem with valedictory Addresses and valedictory Replies, as well as with accounts of parting ceremonies of various descriptions. The Earl of DALHOUSIE has closed his labours as Governor-in-Chief, and though violently opposed during a great part of his administration by a host of "agitators," yet if we may judge from the improvements which have taken place in the Agricultural interests of the Canadas, the establishment of Literary institutions, completion of Canals, &c. under his auspices, as well as from a simultaneous movement in almost all quarters, to pay him every parting tribute of respect which the strongest feelings of attachment to his person, family, and government could call forth, we may confidently affirm, that the era of the DALHOUSIE Administration will be long remembered with exultation by the best friends of those fine Provinces, and will hold a distinguished place in the annals of Canadian history. Of Sir JAMES KEMPT and his Administration, we ventured to state our sentiments on the occasion of his departure from the neighbouring Province. Changes and consequent movements are still in prospect. We are grieved to think that we ourselves are to be deeply interested in them, but when a great public duty is to be discharged, and the proprietorship of a large and valuable territory is to be determined, far be it from us to yield for one moment to any narrow or selfish considerations whatever.

The amount of private subscriptions raised in this City in behalf of the unfortunate Emigrants from Rio de Janeiro, was £32, and Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, on being informed of that sum having been realized, immediately redeemed his pledge of giving from the Casual Revenue double that amount, namely, £64. We are gratified to state that a large proportion of these individuals are now either usefully employed in our own neighbourhood, or have been sent off to other parts of the Province, and that we have not lately been called to witness such disgraceful scenes as some of them exhibited on their first arrival. Uncommon exertions have certainly been made in behalf of these sufferers, for in some instances the very pulpit was put in requisition, and made the organ of an appeal in their behalf. And we learn that some families have laid aside articles of clothing for them, but have not been called upon according to the intimation publicly given.

It gives us much satisfaction to announce the appointment of E. J. JARVIS, Esquire, lately King's Assessor at Malta, to the office of Chief Justice of Prince Edward's Island.

It must be gratifying to the feelings of the inhabitants of that Island, to receive accounts of the appointment of so able and distinguished a Lawyer as Mr. Jarvis, is, to fill that important situation.—Courier.
