Whitman Firm for Repeal.

Albany, Feb. 9.—Governor Whitman has denied a report that he was considering the creation of a new state boxing commission, composed of amateur members and with General James W. Wadsworth, father of United States Senator Wadsworth, at its head. Governor Wadsworth is now a member of the State Racing Commission, also an honorary position.

"There is no foundation for the report," said the governor. "I am just as firmly convinced at this moment as I was when I sent my message to the legislature that the entire law governing public boxing exhibitions should be repealed. I do not believe that public boxing exhibitions should be continued as a means of raising money for the state treasury. Some of the recent exhibitions in Madison Square Garden I regard as simply disgraceful. The people do not want anything like that."

Governor Whitman said that the repeal of the law would not prevent sporting exhibitions before private audiences under club auspices. "It would be the duty of the police and district attorneys to see that the law was not violated at such exhibitions," said the governor.

The general opinion at the capital is that the legislature will fall in line.

Boston, Feb. 8.—It is reported that Manager Jack Barry of the Red Sox has placed "Snaky" Joe Wood, one time pitcher of Boston fans, on the market. Wood is still on the reserve list of the Red Sox, and with the retirement of Bill Carrigan Barry finds himself in need of a catcher. The new manager is said to have offered Wood to Cleveland yesterday for Steve O'Neil.

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 8.—Thomas Leach, manager last year of the Rochester team in the International League, and formerly with the Pittsburgh Nationals, has been signed as utility man for the Kansas City team in the American Association.

Miske to Meet Levinsky
New York, Feb. 8.—After considerable haggling, the details for a bout between Billy Miske, sensational St. Paul light heavyweight and Battling Levinsky, clever Hebrew heavyweight of this city, have been completed. They are booked to meet in a ten-round bout at the Capital City A.C. of St. Paul, Minn., on the night of Feb. 27. Levinsky is to receive a guarantee of \$1,000 with the option of 30 per cent. of the gross receipts and railroad transportation for three.

Chairman of the State Athletic Commission, sent a letter to Fire Commissioner Robert Adamson asking the aid of the commissioner and the fire department. It has been found that smoking has a detrimental effect on the work of boxers in the ring, and also interferes in a large measure with the enjoyment of ordinary enthusiasts derives from watching a bout. It is said.

It was learned that it is the intention of Grant Hugh Browne to prohibit smoking at any of the bouts which he will hold in Madison Square Garden. Browne's rule will get its first tryout at a bout between Fred Fulton and Charlie Weinert on next Monday night. Chairman Wenck also announced that he had sent recommendations to the two up-state commissioners, Messrs. Fancey and Dwyer of the Olympic A. C. of Hartford to suspend indefinitely for refusal to refund the spectators' money when his show was called off last night and that Young Sandy, a bantamweight, be suspended for thirty days for failure to go on with his bout at the Olympic club on Monday night. It is alleged that despite the demands made by the spectators that their money be refunded when the advertised boxers failed to appear, they received only "rain checks," good for some future show.

Wenck also stipulated in his recommendations that the Olympic A. C. be not reinstated until all the boxing enthusiasts who held coupons for last Monday's show had received their money.

HOCKEY.

Harvard vs. McGill Tonight

Boston, Mass., Feb. 8.—Everything points to a capacity attendance at the hockey game in the Arena on Saturday night between Harvard and McGill University. McGill always has been the favorite among the Canadian college teams, annually visiting Boston and more than the usual enthusiasm is likely to be manifested Saturday night because it will be "Canadian Night," and the game of the closer feeling between Canada and the United States because of the present war situation is pretty sure to be in evidence. All this week there has been a steady call for tickets to the game.

Harvard is counting on a victory. The players began to show signs of real hockey towards the end of the game with Princeton and if they could only get their team work a little smoother in the first half of the game, they would excel even more than has been the case.

Victory over McGill would install confidence for the series soon to begin with Yale and for the third game with Princeton, which now looms up as a more difficult task even than the series with the Elis.

War May Stop Hockey in U.S.

Boston, Feb. 8.—Among the hockey players there is a feeling of apprehension as a result of the threatened entrance of the United States into the great war. Captain Freddie Huntington of the B.A.A. seven, is a top sergeant in the battery while Danter Sands, his left wing, is a private. Then, too, Harvard would suffer in the event of a call for troops, as George Percy, the greatest college player of the season, is also a member of the battery.
