DAFOE FOR CABINET?

(Ottawa Free Press.)

A Toronto newspaper publishes a rumour that John W. Dafeo, the editor of the Winnipeg Free Press, is to be taken into the Cabinet by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Of course the rumour can be neither denied nor confirmed in Ottawa in the absence of the Prime Minister, but it is nevertheless, interesting. John Dafeo—big, burly, sandy-haired, well known in Ottawa. For years he occupied a seat in the Parliamentary press gallery. But he has grown bigger in every way in the years that he has lived in the west.

As the editor of the newspaper that "covers the west like a blanket," he has sat at the heart of things, and has participated actively and continuously in the tremendous development of that wonderful territory. He has had opportunities for testing the pulse of that community of lightning growth such as no other man probably has had. But hitherto the personality of John Dafeo has been sunk in the paper whose

policy he controls and expresses. Would he be willing now to come into the limelight personally? There are still men in Canada who, like George Brown, would rather be the editor of a great newspaper, influencing the opinions of a multitude, than the prime minister. We would say that John Dafeo is one of these. It may be, however, that the wider field needs John Dafeo's abilities, his knowledge of the west and its problems, his immense power of concentration, his faculty of probing into the very marrow of things. It may be that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who above all things is a judge of men, is convinced that Canada needs this newspaperman who has been proven and not found wanting.

It may be that the Prime Minister, realizing the extraordinary expansion of the west, sees the necessity of another man in the Cabinet who is typical of the west and its aspirations and its possibilities. We do not know how much of truth there is in the rumour, but we do know that if John Dafeo is offered and accepts a position in the Dominion Cabinet, Canada will be the gainer. John Dafeo is a rugged Canadian, a good speaker, a good writer, a good reasoner, and a broad and practical thinker.

The Growing West

(From the Manitoba Free Press.) When Sir Wilfrid Laurier became Prime Minister of Canada the west had 1,000,000 inhabitants. The number now is thirty-five, and it is probable that next year's Dominion census will give the west a representative fifty-five members at Ottawa. The west is destined to dominate in the affairs of the Dominion, and the present century will have advanced very far on its course before that destiny is fulfilled.

The Evening Chit-Chat

SERVE AFTERNOON TEA IN YOUR SUMMER COTTAGE ON MISION TABARETS, MARKED FROM \$3. The dining sign placed to advantage in the centre aisle of the store caught my eye, and I looked beneath it and saw a collection of little tables, lily put together, obviously of cheap material but saved by being made in the "arts and crafts" style that at present covers a multitude of sins.

A dozen women were examining the goods. Two were buying and two on the brink of it. Not one of them looked as if her husband belonged above the twenty-dollar-a-week class, and I don't believe any of them wanted the tabarets for any specific purpose. "I can't say as I ever have afternoon tea, but I do like that mission stuff. It gives some class to a room," was a sentiment expressed by one of the purchasers, and received with evident approval by another.

As I watched this interesting and typical little scene I remembered with a smile the experience of a certain newspaper man who went into a novelty shop to look around.

A shiny object attracted his attention and he inquired the fact that any of the dealers, from the first to the thirty-second in the alleged American and foreign Masonic degree, may be bought in the open market. Perrot's prices range from \$85 for the blue lodge work to \$175 for the more advanced degrees.

Major R. D. Oweid, former Indian fighter and veteran of the Custer expedition, now sidekick inspector for the city of Spokane and a member of a local Masonic lodge, preferred the charge in the Spokane police court where, after passing several hours in a cell, Perrot was bound of \$500 for his appearance. Del Cary Smith, past worthy, grand president of the Eagles, who has been retained as counsel, said Perrot is a member in good standing of twelve secret and fraternal orders, adding that he holds a certificate issued by I. M. Howell, secretary of the degree of Washington, authorizing him to "do business" under the American Masonic Federation of Idaho, also that Perrot is an official of the American Federation of Masonic Lodges, incorporated under the laws of the state of Washington. Documents found in an office occupied by Perrot show he is an agent for the Scottish Grand Council of Rites and is working here under the direction of A. E. Lucas of Tacoma, deputy grand marshal of Washington, while some of the stationery picked up in the ruined quarters indicates that the "sixteenth" and the "thirtieth" degrees of Masonry were also dealt in by Perrot. The police found a ritual and a seal of the Order of the Scottish Grand Council of Rites and books and papers dealing with that organization.

S. Harry Ruah, secretary of the Masonic Temple Association of Spokane, said in an interview that no degrees conferred by the Idaho organization are recognized by the lodges in Spokane. "The Masonic order has no solicitors and I never solicit members," he added, "and it is not probable that Perrot has been authorized by any recognized body to sell the degrees."

Perrot declares he has the right to confer the first three degrees in Masonry by virtue of holding office in the American Federation of Masonic Lodges, saying also that the power to confer the degrees, from the fourth to the thirty-second, is vested by authority sent to him by the Scottish Rite Masonic Order of Scotland. He has been organizing Thistle Lodge, No. 8, in Spokane, and had applications from five men, each of whom paid \$85 for membership.

"My arrest is the result of 'stool pigeon' work on the part of the Masonic lodge," Perrot said. "I expected it if I took his money, gave him a receipt and told him to call a few days later for the degrees. That would have given me time to ascertain if he is a member of the Masonic order in good standing and entitled to the work."

"This is not the first time I have had trouble. I have encountered opposition elsewhere, but the Masons learned it did not pay to fool with me. They will find that out sooner or later. They will find that while officers of the Masonic lodges in Spokane decline to discuss the matter for publication, it is known that an investigation is under way to ascertain if the credentials found among Perrot's effects are substantiated by any Masonic order in the world. Reports are also current that the arrest of Perrot is another link in the battle between the American Masons

NAME AND BREED WON'T COUNT AT THIS CATTLE SHOW The Critters That Indicate the Tenderest Eating Will Carry Off the Prizes at St. Paul, in November

St. Paul, Minn., July 22.—According to plans made for the Northwestern Live Stock show to be held at Union stock yards, South St. Paul, November 15 to 18th, aristocratic cattle will not find their names on the list of those who are invited, just because the blue blood of ancestry runs in their veins. The proud Angus, Holstein, Durham, Hereford or representative of any other breed whose chief qualification is a pedigree which would fill a volume of the Congressional Record, will find himself lined up by the side of other animals whose claim to distinction is simply best—good, wholesome, juicy, and beef. And prizes will be awarded only when plain cattle will enter a contest of merits on the same ground as cattle of the aristocracy. Many cases are on record where unpedigreed cattle have shown up better than cattle whose owners boast of long pedigrees which go with the name. At the Northwestern exhibit, the heifer called "Maiden Lane, XIX," of "Queen Helen, X," will have no better rating than will just "Maude" or "Middy." On the other hand, "King Leo" will be on the same footing as "Big Tom," or just "Jim." There will be nothing in the name.

When the show has ended, many of the cattle will be sold on the market, which means they will be sold right where the event takes place on the Union stock yards ground. In this way, stock raisers will learn much about what and how to breed for slaughter purposes. An auction sale will also be held the last day of the show, at which all the stock exhibited last year attracted much interest and caused many extra "tablets" to go into the coffers of the men who know how to produce good market cattle.

St. John, N. B., July 21.—(Special)—Sir Wilfrid Laurier and party arrived at Melville (Sask.) this morning, and the premier is enjoying the first day's rest of his tour. This town is the surprise of the west. It has a population of 5,000 with banks, hotels, churches and all accessories of a thriving town, and two years ago the spot where it stands was a wilderness. This afternoon premier attended a game of ball between the ministerial party and the pressmen who accompany the tour. The ministers' team won by nine to seven.

Ottawa, July 21.—(Special)—E. S. Kirkpatrick, trade agent in Cuba, advises the trade and commerce department that in the first month of the fiscal year there has been an increase of 60 per cent. in trade with Canada.

Halifax, July 21.—(Special)—The royal commission on technical education met at Lunenburg and Bridgewater today. The chief evidence concerned fishing, boat building and lumbering. T. G. Nicol and Mrs. Scotia's rivers could develop 300,000 horsepower and Liverpool river alone 50,000.

Montreal, July 21.—(Special)—As the result of repeated conferences extending over several weeks, a definite agreement was reached this afternoon between the C. P. R. Company and its conductors and trainmen and all possibilities that the Grand Trunk men and go out on strike is now removed.

Montreal, July 21.—(Special)—Three men were drowned at a picnic of the Montreal Light, Heat & Power Company, Monday afternoon, at Maple Grove. Four were in a boat and it capsized through the men changing positions.

One of them, Higgins, was rescued. The other three, Dugas, Perrot and Peladeau, all employees of the company, disappeared before help could be got to them.
