WHITE STAR LINE'S SALE CONFIRMED

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 30.—The Halifax office of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company gave out the following statement in part last night: "Advices received today by the New York office of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company confirm the purchase by the Royal Mail from the International Mercantile Marine Company of the White Star Line which for many years has occupied a leading position in the Transatlantic passenger-carrying trade. The Royal Mail through this purchase adds nearly 500,000 tons of shipping to its fleet, already the largest in the world, and brings under its flag such Transatlantic liners as the Majestic, the largest ship afloat, the Olympic and the Homeric. "The Royal Mail recently built and put into operation the biggest motor liner now in service, the Asturias which will sail from New York in January on the company's African cruise. Through the acquisition of the Majestic, therefore, it will own the largest steamship and the largest motor-liner now in operation. The fleet controlled by the Royal Mail exceeded 2,000,000 tons prior to the purchase and with the acquisition of the White Star Line, this figure will now be increased to 2,200,000 tons."

TO NEW POSITION.

F. W. Strong, who had been connected with the passenger department of the C. P. R. here and who is a son of C. D. Strong, of the same company, has severed his connection with the organization and will leave today for Montreal where he has accepted a position.

SYRIAN PRIEST LEAVES.

Rev. Father Tlabone, of the Greek Catholic church in Syria, who has been here for some days, left for Montreal on the noon train today and after speaking in other sections of the province and in Nova Scotia, will return to Quebec and New York and hence back to the Orient. He has been a picturesque figure about town in his patriarchal robes and with flowing white hair.

AT COURTESY BAY.

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Report Better On Employment Here

During November placements made by the local branch of the Employment Bureau of Canada were 191 men and 219 women, which was about per cent. better than for the corresponding month in 1925. The majority of calls for men were for extra gangs on the railways, due to ballasting having to be done, owing to the heavy rains, and for workers in the woods. There also has been a considerable call for miners from the Minto district and some demand for carpenters for the Grand Falls undertaking. "There was still a big demand for pulp wood cutters, especially in the southern section of the province, all the way from Charlotte county to Albert, it was said. "The demand for women was mostly for day workers for cleaning up houses during the winter. There always was a demand, however, for good, experienced maids, which the bureau could not catch up with, it was said. The starting up of winter activities at the port would help conditions considerably around the city, it was reported, especially as a good season was looked for by the steamship men.
