sent them to Lady Allenby. The guest list included members of the I. O. D. This evening at 9 o'clock Lord Allenby will be attending a public gathering in the Imperial Theatre, where Douglas Hazen will preside. The Imperial orchestra and theatre organ will provide a recital program while the audience assembles and the National Anthem will be played to greet the distinguished guest.

There has been a heavy advance sale of seats for tonight's public meeting and as care has been taken not to over sell the capacity of the theatre, there is only a limited supply of seats still available.

It was learned today that upon the sailing of Lady Allenby in the private box at the Imperial Theatre tonight she will be made the recipient of flowers from the Hebrew ladies of Saint John, a fragrant tribute, the like of which Lady Allenby has received from the Jewish people throughout her Canadian journey.

The Imperial stage will be specially arranged with garden furniture and patriotically decorated. After the picture show, which will terminate about 8.30 those in the audience holding tickets for the Lord Allenby meeting will have their tickets collected and the balance of the upstairs seats will be sold at the box office.

DUBLIN, March 31.—Two tons of high explosives, 288 live bombs and 6,000 rounds of rifle ammunition, and 10,000 detonators in addition to bomb making machinery have been found in a stable in North King street. It is said the stable is owned by Maurice Fenlon, who escaped from Mount Joy prison some time ago. No arrests have been made.

PRINCESS VICTORIA STILL GRAVELY ILL. Prince of Wales, However, is Making Rapid Progress, Says Bulletin.

LONDON, March 31.—Anxiety still continued today regarding the condition of Princess Victoria, sister of King George, who is suffering from influenza pneumonia. Lord Dawson, physician to the King, visited the Princess this morning, and later a bulletin was issued saying: "The Princess had some hours sleep, and her cough is less troublesome. Her temperature remains high. The condition of the heart is unchanged."

FASCISTS RESIGN. Five of Directorate Quit to Leave "Mussolini's Hand Free".

LONDON, March 31.—The correspondent of the Daily Express in Rome reports that coincident with the resignation of Roberto Farinacci, secretary general of the Fascist party, five members of the Fascist Directorate have resigned. "We wish to leave Mussolini's hand completely free" the five Fascist directors explained.

U. S. GETS BID. GENEVA, March 31.—The United States has been formally invited to appoint a delegation to meet with representatives of the world court signatories here on September first to frame an agreement which may be necessitated by the United States reservations in adhering to the court.

TWO NEGROES KILLED. DAWSON, Ga., March 31.—Two negroes were killed and property damage estimated at \$200,000 was caused by a storm that swept through Terrell and Lee counties late last night. Houses were demolished and trees uprooted.

DIGBY TAX RATE REMAINS AT \$2.75. DIGBY, March 30.—The Town Council, at its regular meeting last evening, brought down the estimates for the year 1926-27, and the rate per \$100 remains the same as last year, that of \$2.75. This rate has been in force since 1921.

EXTRA TAXES WILL LAST UNTIL BUDGET CAN BE BALANCED. Baxter Tells Government Stand to Ross of Bankers' Association.

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 30.—That the proposed new taxes to increase the revenue of the province as outlined in Hon. Antoine J. Gagnier's budget speech are only a temporary measure until the budget can be balanced was the reply Premier Baxter made today to Henry T. Ross, Montreal, representing the Canadian Bankers' Association, who appeared before the government to protest against the proposed increase in the provincial tax on banks.

HOPE OF GOVERNMENT. From Premier Baxter's statement, it is a fairly safe assumption that the conditions right themselves, as the government hopes to be able to do through the year's deficit and just as the amount of the direct tax hinges on this, so also will the hope of reduction in various other directions depend.

RETIRED MARINER WELL KNOWN HERE. Captain Carsten Christian Hoescher Had Fine Career at Sea.

A retired marine officer who at one time was well known in Saint John is Capt. Carsten Christian Hoescher, who is now living in Brighton, Charlottetown. Capt. Hoescher says he will always remember the Bay of Fundy as much as he had two thrilling experiences there, each time narrowly escaping death.

FUNERALS. Dorothy D. V. Dupliss. The funeral of Dorothy D. V. Dupliss, who died on Tuesday afternoon from pneumonia, will be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow at the St. Ann's church.
