FAST SAILING BY PARRSBORO VESSEL

Minas King Makes Trip to New York and Return in Thirty Days

Special to The Times-Star. YARMOUTH, June 25.—The Parrsboro tern schooner Minas King, 450 tons, Captain Harvey Randall, is in Yarmouth with a cargo of 800 tons of anthracite coal. On arrival here the Minas King completed a round voyage from Parrsboro with 400,000 feet of coal and returned to Yarmouth in just 30 days, which is considered to be excellent time. The run from New York to Yarmouth was a good one and from Vineyard Haven, where the schooner put in after leaving New York, to Yarmouth, the distance was covered in 28 hours. The Minas King will go from here to Port Greville, where the vessel will undergo survey and from there will proceed to Parrsboro to spin loose lumber for New York.

INVOKE JAY TREATY

Indians, Held in U. S. For Deportation, Get Stay in Proceedings

J., June 25.—The Jay treaty between Great Britain and the United States says that "Indians as native Americans may hunt and fish on both sides of the Canadian and United States line, and may trade the length and breadth of North America without molestation." Counsel for Paul Diabo and his wife, who are held for deportation on charges of having come from the Caughnawaga reservation at Montreal to the United States illegally, has invoked the Jay treaty to stay proceedings with temporary success.

CURRIE HONORED

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 24.—The honorary degree of Doctor of Law was today conferred upon Sir Arthur Currie, principal of McGill University, Montreal, and commander of the Canadian forces in the war, at the annual commencement exercises of Harvard University. Eleven honorary degrees were bestowed by President A. Lawrence Lowell, Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the United States Treasury, and George Fisher Baker, banker, being among the invested.



Both at Fault in Collision Case

That is Jury's Verdict in Action of R. F. Wright vs. B. S. Purdy

In the Circuit Court yesterday afternoon in the case of R. F. Wright vs. B. S. Purdy, an action for damages arising out of an automobile collision at the corner of Wall street and City Road last fall, the jury returned a verdict in which they apportioned the blame for the accident equally between the parties. They said, in answer to the questions submitted to them, that the plaintiff did not keep a proper lookout at the intersection of the streets and that the defendant was traveling at a greater rate of speed than he should have.

Supreme Court Costs
