Elected Head of The 'Prentice Boys OLD BURIAL GROUND

Legislature Would Have to Pass Act for Memorial Park Plan.

Under the legislation which governs the use of the Old Burying Ground it would be impossible for the city to use this area as a park without first going to the legislature and securing an amendment to an act which was passed in March, 1848, and which sets forth that this area is not to be used for any purpose than a burying ground Under the act passed at that time the City Council is forbidden to place any building in the graveyard or to disturb any grave but they are not required to fence it, the law in this con-

quired to fence it, the law in this connection being only permissive.

The following sections f.om the Act show very fully just what the powers of the Council are in this regard:

"And whereas under and by virtue of the charter of the City of Saint John, the legal estate in the said burial ground became vested in the Mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the City of Saint John, and the same has been since held by them as and for a public burial ground, and for no other use or purpose;
