lead to unhappy business conditions similar to those which followed the great war, was pointed out by the economic policy committee in a report to the executive council of the American Bankers Association, in session at the Westchester-Biltmore Country Chib, at Ryc, N. Y., last week. The assembled bankers approved the report in which the committee expressed its distrust of the present business prosperity.

"The economic policy committee of the American Bankers' Association looks with concern on the strong upward swing of wages and prices," the report reads, "and fears that overconfidence may lead to a repetition of some of the mistakes committed in the period following the war. In some respects the economic situation of the country is out of balance, due to compounded increases in commodity prices, artificial fixing of labor, hours and Fanous Players 843% 843%

Washington, April 30.—A new high record for petroleum production was established in March, which averaged more than 1,810,000 barrels a day, the Geological Survey announced last week.

Consumption, indicated by deliveries to consumers during the first quarter of the year, was at the record rate of 655,000,000 barrels. Production plus imports, however, maintained the lead over consumption plus exports, so that pipe-line and tank-farm stocks increased during the first three months of 1923 by 8,507,000 barrels.


