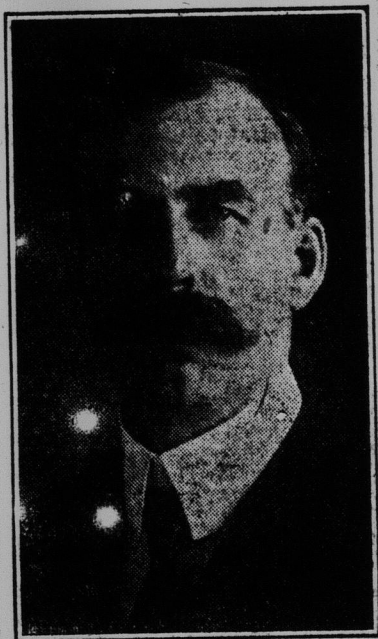

## DEATH CLAIMS

**HON. F. J. SWEENEY**

Former Member of N. B. Government—In Earlier Days a School Teacher in St. John.

Death yesterday removed another well-known figure in the life of the province, when Hon. Francis J. Sweeney, K. C., of Moncton died in the Royal Victoria hospital in Montreal. Mr. Sweeney went to

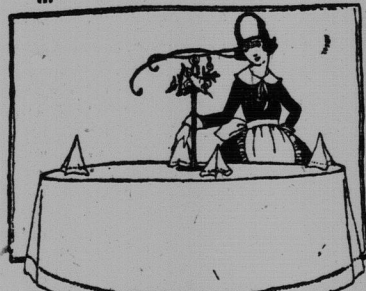


HON. F. J. SWEENEY.

Moncton a week ago to undergo an operation for cancer of the liver. Telegrams brought the information that he was sinking, and Rev. Edward Savage left for Moncton yesterday morning to be with him when he died, but did not reach him before he had passed away. Only a short time ago Mr. Sweeney returned after a health trip to the West Indies. Mr. Sweeney was born at Melrose, Westmorland county, on April 21, 1862. He was a graduate of St. Joseph's University. For many years he was a member of the local legislature, and in 1904 was appointed surveyor-general of the province. He was a Catholic in religion and a life-long Liberal in politics. Some thirty-five years ago Mr. Sweeney was a teacher in St. Malachi's

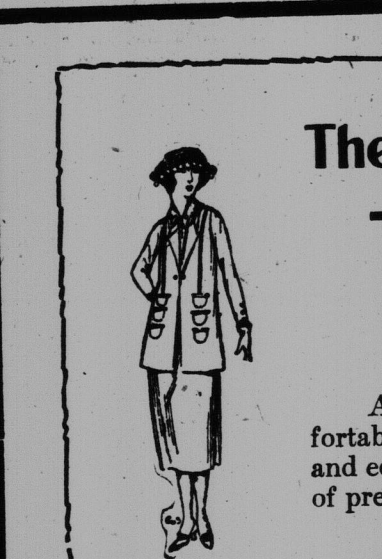
school in St. John. He gained great popularity in this city, for he was bright and genial, of keen wit, one who readily made friends and retained them. In amateur theatricals of that day Mr. Sweeney took a prominent part. Such men as Miles E. Agar, P. Joseph, J. L. Carleton, and others. One of the plays produced was "Judge Cadeaux's More Sinners Against Than Sinning." Mr. Sweeney gave up the teaching profession for that of law and removed to Moncton. He started the practice of his profession in partnership with the late Arthur J. Robinson, brother of the Hon. C. W. Robinson, minister of lands and mines. On the removal of his partner to California, Mr. Sweeney formed a partnership with David Grant, now Judge Grant of Vancouver (B. C.) under the firm name of Grant & Sweeney. Since Mr. Grant's removal from Moncton, Mr. Sweeney had practiced his profession by himself. He is survived by three brothers, John of Dorchester, Dennis A. of Melrose and Michael, residing in St. John. The late Mrs. P. G. Mahoney, of Melrose, was a sister. His parents died several years ago. Hon. Mr. Sweeney was a prominent Moncton barrister and as one of New Brunswick's public men had a wide acquaintance. Mr. Sweeney was prominent in the Knights of Columbus, was the first knight of Moncton council, later became state deputy, and at the time of his death held the rank of past state deputy. He is held in kindly memory in this city, where he leaves relatives as well as friends, and thousands who sympathize with those bereaved.

## HON. MR. ROWELL SPEAKS ON THE NATIONS LEAGUE

"Because the League of Nations had been born of the heart cry of humanity for the peaceful settlement of international disputes and because the common people everywhere would in future demand that dispute between nations would be settled without resort to war, Hon. N. W. Rowell, K. C., M. P., one of Canada's delegates to the first meeting of the assembly of the League of Nations, declared that the league would attain the ideal for which it was set up in an address delivered before a joint meeting of the Canadian Club and the Women's Canadian Club in the Rythian Castle last night.

So long as great nations outside the league were under no obligation to reduce armaments, Mr. Rowell said, little advance could be made in the process of disarmament. The United States, he said, was a determining factor in the disarmament situation and he professed to see hope in the recent addresses of President Harding in which sympathy was expressed with the policy of a limitation of armaments.

Mr. Rowell told of the aims and objects of the league its organization and the work accomplished by the recent assembly. The fact that the assembly had met was in itself a great achievement. The greatest concrete piece of work it had accomplished was to provide for the organization of an international court of justice. The public opinion of the world would compel nations to bring their disputes before this court for settlement, he said. He expected that the court would be created in September of this year. Horace A. Porter, president of the Canadian Club, was chairman of the meeting at which about 800 were present. Mrs. Leonard Tilley, president of the Women's Canadian Club, moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Rowell at the conclusion of his address. After referring to his previous address

in St. John during the period of the war, Mr. Rowell said that he had come this time to speak on what he ventured to suggest was the most hopeful feature that had emerged from the late great war, namely, the League of Nations. The league, Mr. Rowell said, offered the best prospect of conserving that for which the soldiers had fought, namely, the overthrow of militarism and the preservation of peace. Mr. Rowell said that the presence of such a large audience at the League of Nations discussed was evidence of the widening horizon of Canadian citizenship. Before Confederation, Mr. Rowell said, provincial boundaries limited the conception of citizenship. With the advent of Confederation the conception of citizenship was widened to include a
