New York, March 5.—Invitation to the New York baseball team to travel by airplane from New York to Philadelphia for the opening game of the season on April 25, was received today at club headquarters. SOCIALIZATION PROGRAMME OF EBERT GOVERNMENT.  
The Ebert government has announced that the draft of a general socialization law and a bill socializing the mines will be submitted today to the federal council. By this step the government hopes to take the wind out of the sails of the radicals who have been making gains because of the government's delay in the socialization programme.

URGENT THAT WAR BE ENDED QUICKLY  
Ludendorff Knew Germany Was Beaten in August of Last Year—Ground Had Become Shaky

Copenhagen, March 5.—A despatch from Berlin quotes an interview with General Ludendorff, former first quartermaster-general of the German army, in which Ludendorff repeats former statements that he desired peace on the basis of the status quo, both in 1917 and in 1918.

Ludendorff is reported to have said that the events in August of last year showed that the value of some units in the German army had depreciated and that an improvement was not to be expected in view of the fact that the war had broken the will of the people at home. Afterwards the ground had become shaky, said Ludendorff, and he informed the government that it was no longer possible to make Germany's enemies desire peace by means of war, and that the warfare should be ended quickly.

After the collapse of Bulgaria, according to the interview, Ludendorff demanded that the German government make an offer of peace, but he added that it was a mistake to say that he demanded an armistice within twenty-four hours.

Ludendorff denied reports of dissension between the emperor and the Crown Prince. He said the Crown Prince often spoke of peace by an understanding. Ludendorff expressed a willingness that his actions should be tried before any unprejudiced man of common sense.

SMOKE MACDONALD'S INDEX MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES  
The British government has decided to release all political prisoners. In order to prevent a great public demonstration the prisoners will return to Ireland in small batches.

In the House of Commons yesterday the Right Hon. Winston Churchill said that Canadian losses at the Ypres salient from July 31 to Nov. 18, 1917, were 496 officers and 11,917 men. The Canadians moved in to the salient and participated in the battle of Passchendaele where they gained an important victory.

A drowning fatality occurred at Concession, Digby County, yesterday, when three boys attempted to cross Specular lake and broke through the ice. The mother of two of them, Mrs. Philip Gaudet, heard their cries and rushing to the lake broke through the ice and waded out to her neck, saving the lives of two of the boys. The third lad was out farther and it was some time before he was taken from the water. All efforts at resuscitation failed. He was fourteen.

POLICE COURT.  
Harris Gilbert, who conducts a second hand store at 24 Mill street, was in the police court yesterday afternoon, charged with buying military goods contrary to the Criminal Code. The case was adjourned until Monday, when the counsel for the military authorities, Capt. G. Earl Logan, will be present.

R. C. Perkins was arrested by Inspector Garnett yesterday afternoon on the arrival of the Montreal train and brought him before the magistrate, who fined the accused \$200. Perkins admitted having liquor in his possession, but declared it belonged to another man. Being a stranger in the city, he had to wire to friends in order to get the amount of his fine.

Store Awnings.  
The old order-in-council, which provides that store awnings shall be at least eight feet above the street, will not be enforced, according to a statement by Commissioner Thornton. It will be compulsory that store-keepers raise their awnings at least seven feet above the street.

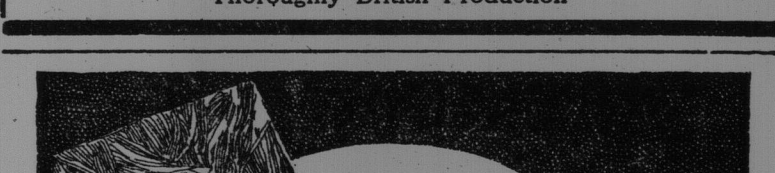
