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SAY BULGARIANS HID THE GREEK VICTIMS

Impeded Repatriation Work And
Tried to Conceal Terrible Death
Rate

Washington, April 24—Repatriation of nearly 60,000 Greeks, who were removed from their homes during the war by the Bulgars, has been practically completed. Reports received today at American Red Cross headquarters here said the Bulgars tried in every way possible to impede the repatriation work and endeavored to conceal the fact that thousands of the Greeks had died during their internment from starvation and exposure. Great difficulty was encountered in locating the Greeks in the remote parts of Bulgaria, it was said, as the Bulgars refused to stay where they were interned. At Karagatch the Bulgars denied there were any refugees, but more than 1,200 were found within a two-hour walk of the station, the report said. About 10,000 others were taken from concentration camps at Dobrudja, Varna and Pleven.

The condition of the rescued Greeks was such that in spite of all that could be done for them many died before reaching their native land," the report continued. The Bulgars tried to avoid responsibility for the deaths of many thousands of the Greeks, and before the report, by claiming that only 60,000 Greek civilians and 11,000 Greek soldiers were interned. The Greeks claim

the number of Greek civilians at 100,000 and of Greek soldiers at 32,000, and assert that the difference between the figures represents the number who died from neglect and mistreatment.

A GREAT CONVENTION

The 26th annual convention of the International Kindergarten Union will be held in Baltimore, Md., May 19 and 23. The president, Miss Caroline D. Aborn, supervisor of Boston kindergartens, has issued a most urgent invitation to all who are interested in elementary education, whether kindergartners or not, to hear the splendid address planned and enter into the discussions. Miss Brown, chairman of the education committee of the Maine Federation of Women's Clubs, has suggested to each federated club in the state that a mother or primary teacher be sent to Baltimore. Dr. George D. Strayer, president of the National Educational Association, will speak on The New Programme of Public Education in the United States. Dr. Henry W. Thurston of the New York School of Philanthropy on A Child Welfare Minimum in the United States. The subject of Americanization will be presented by the United States Commissioner of Education, Dr. P. P. Claxton, and Fred Butler, director of Americanization in the Department of the Interior.

So important will be the mass meeting for kindergartners and primary school teachers that it is expected the board of education will dismiss the schools on the closing day of the convention in order that teachers may hear

Miss Patty S. Hill of Columbia University on The Unification of Kindergarten and Primary School, also Miss Beitha Barwis, supervisor of primary grades in Trenton, N. J., who will talk upon Unifying the Work of Primary Grades. Lantern slides will be used to illustrate and demonstrate actual kindergarten and school experiences.
