The Yankees outfield has always been a light hitting combination. Last year it averaged 211. The Detroit trio averaged 227, the Red Sox gardeners hit at a 271 clip and the White Sox fielders at 294. There's the answer. Until the Yankees dig up a couple of 280 hitters in the outfield they will stay in the second division.

by Hans Wagner at shortstop. It is now an assured fact that Wagner is through a baseball player, and even if he does remain with the Pirates in the capacity of a pinch hitter, it is certain that he will not go into the game unless it is as a substitute at first base.

Barney Dreyfus and his scouts have been combing the minor leagues for a good infielder, and it is said that among those who are being considered for the Pirate job for two former Yankees, Bill Stump and Roney Roach, and a former Brooklyn shortstop, Bunny Fabrique. Stump has been playing in the Pacific Coast League and when Manager Bedick let him quit last season. He needed more good reports about Stump, that he advised Dreyfus to get him.

Roach played with Louisville last season, and he hit at a .251 gait. Roach was always a fast fielder, but when he was with the Yankees he did not set the league on fire through his hitting. Fabrique played with Toledo after Brooklyn let him quit last season. He needed more schooling in the hitting part of the game when Brooklyn released him, but he is said to have improved in the American Association. He hit for an average of .301 with Toledo.

**Fast Horses Died in 1917.**

Eleven trotters and seventeen pacers having records of 2:10 or better, died last year, according to the American Sportsman. The fastest of the trotters was Mary Putney, 2:04.8-4 regarded by some horsemen as a prospective two-minute performer. Others were Pereno, 2:05.1-2; Charley Herr, 2:07; Fair Maid, 2:07; Ruth McGivern, 2:07.1-2; Arion, 2:07.1-2; The Lark, 2:08.1-4; Adheli M., 2:08.4-4; and The Wolverine, 2:09.4-4. Among the noted sires that passed away were Axworthy, 2:15.1-2; and McKinney, 2:11.1-4.

**May Not Retire Real Lady.**

The Real Lady is still in Thomas W. Murphy's stable at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and as she is in perfect condition it is to be hoped that her owner, A. H. Cullen, will reconsider retiring her at least one season. With her in the field the race going public in 1918 would have an opportunity to see the greatest series of five for all that were ever contested in the history of the trotting turf. **THE ARMY'S JAM.**

The organization of the jam manufacturing industry in Dundee, Scotland, with a view to taking care of the enormous requirements of the British army and navy, is one of the commissary triumphs of the war. Having installed modernized and standardized machinery at the outset of the war in 1914, they are now producing jam on a scale hitherto unequalled, and it has been estimated that they would reach up forty tons into the heavens. It is said to be no unusual thing for this firm to deal with 100,000,000 oranges.

Inasmuch as jam may be used to a great extent in place of butter, of which there is a scarcity in England, the government has taken every precaution that the jam industry should get all the sugar it requires. This is in marked contrast to the sugar allowance for candy-makers, which has been cut down to one-quarter of their pre-war consumption.

With tinsule prices gone up beyond all reason, jam manufacturers have shown their ingenuity by introducing a stout cardboard box to take its place as container. It is being used to a great extent also in place of earthenware and glass jars, not only because the initial cost is less, but because it may be thrown away when it is empty, thus doing away with "returned empties."

**FRANCIS QUIMET**

**IS REINSTATED**

Golf Association Lift Ban Against Him as an Amateur

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 25.—The United States Golf Association at its annual meeting here tonight virtually unanimously adopted a resolution reinstating Francis Ouimet, former national amateur golf champion. There was only one dissenting vote.

The action of the association gave full amateur standing to Ouimet, lifting ban lodged against him by the executive committee last year, when Ouimet was suspended for alleged professionalism because of the sale of sporting goods in Boston. This decision created widespread comment in golf circles throughout the country.

The resolution, as adopted on the recommendation of the executive committee, explained that the action was taken because of Ouimet's presence in the national army, as a sergeant, and the fact that he had severed his personal connection with his sporting goods business.
