## POLICE COURT

In the police court this morning before Magistrate Ritchie, George Coleman, aged 18, charged with being drunk and assaulting George Catherine, pleaded guilty and was remanded. As a result of his arrest for drunkenness, a charge of selling liquor to a minor was made against William Rafferty and F. L. Peterson. Both pleaded guilty and were fined \$20 each.

Charles Johnston pleaded guilty to assaulting a Syrian boy named George Solomon, and was fined \$20 or two months in jail but the fine was allowed to stand against him on the promise of good behavior. The other had admitted using profane language to Johnston and fined \$8, but this fine was also allowed to stand.

## ENFORCE THE LAW RE EXPLOSIVES

**City Commissioners Will Give Public Notice and Then Demand Strict Compliance**

A strict enforcement of the law governing the storage of explosives was decided upon by the city commissioners at their noon meeting today. Some time ago a by-law covering the matter was passed but so far it has not been observed and, on the recommendation of the commissioner of public safety, it was decided to insist upon the enforcement of the law after due warning.

Posters will be displayed around the city giving an extract from the law. This will contain section 42 of the law relating to the fire department, protection against fires and for the better extinguishing of fires. It reads as follows:—

"No person shall store any dynamite, giant powder, nitro-glycerine, calcium nitrate, blasting caps or any high explosive within the fire limits of the City of St. John under penalty of \$100 for each and every offence, and forfeiture of said explosives; except in some safe and secure magazine for the same to be approved by the common council."

The posters will be taken as giving sufficient warning to all concerned and after a reasonable time the law will be strictly enforced without discrimination. This action has been deemed necessary on account of loose methods now employed which the commissioners fear would inevitably result in some one being blown up and, possibly, in a general conflagration.

In order to provide safe storage for such materials the mayor suggested that the city might secure legislation giving the city the exclusive right to store explosives in large quantities and would thus have the enforcement of the law in their own hands.

As an illustration of the need for such steps mention was made of a case in the centre of the city where blasting operations are being conducted and the extra dynamite is being stored in a safe in the middle of the blasting operations.

## SAYS WHEN SHE WAS WED HERE, HUSBAND ALREADY HAD WIFE

**Jessie H. Bostwick Wants Marriage to William E. Tibbets of Amesbury Annulled**

A Boston special despatch to the Times says—Jessie H. Bostwick, of Boston, is petitioner for nullity of her marriage to William E. Tibbets of Amesbury, otherwise known as Wilfred E. Tibbets, in the superior court, on the ground he had a wife living when she married him.

She went through the marriage ceremony with him in St. John on August 12, 1911, and has lived with him in Boston. She declares his wife is still living and resides in Amesbury.
