

Charles Jewtraw is the New International Champion; Pacid Skaters Take Honors

TWO THIRDS IN SATURDAY'S EVENTS, GAVE HIM TEN POINT MARGIN

Great Comeback of Joe Moore Who Won Half and Three Mile Events and Was Runner-up in Series—Local Boys do Well—Gladys Robinson Turns in Perfect Score.

Charles Jewtraw of Lake Placid, probably the most consistent skater in America, came through with two thirds places in Saturday's races and won the international championship by a scant margin of ten points over Joe Moore of New York. Harry Kasky of Chicago and Richard Donovan of Johnson City were tied for third place with seventy points each, ten less than Joe Moore.

The finish of the last race, the three-mile, was finished with Jewtraw in third place. If Jewtraw had not finished in the money by missing the first heat, three skaters, Moore, Jewtraw and Kasky, who was fourth in the distance event, would have had eighty points each, and a skate-off would have been necessary. The Lake Placid star had the necessary punch at the last minute, however, to clinch the championship.

Moore's sensational comeback was the big feature of the last day's racing. He entered the two final races with only twenty points to his credit and made the highest possible, bringing himself within reaching distance of the title. Charlie Gorman of St. John was fifth in the meet with thirty points, all scored in the first day's racing. The lap prize of a medal and \$33 worth of merchandise was won by William McKeen, and the \$15 worth of merchandise was won by Donovan, J. Steinmetz, Reed, Holmboe and Moore.

Gladys Robinson of Toronto won the international women's championship with 120 points, with Rose Johnson second with eighty. Miss Robinson won all her races, although she was pushed in a couple by Miss Johnson.

The Junior Events.

The junior events all went to Lake Placid skaters. J. Sheffield won in the sixteen-year-old class, with W. Smith of Montreal second and Willie Logan of St. John third. In the fourteen-year-old class, Carl Parody of Lake Placid was the leader, with J. Sheffield second and J. Holland of Milwaukee third. Sheffield won in his class, the twelve-year-old, with Harry Smyth of Montreal following. In the ten-year-old, Eugene Shea followed his brother's lead and won handsily, with D. A. McKeen and Richard Lee of St. John second.

Joe Moore's time of 8:44 3-5 in the three-mile race equaled the record claimed by Richard Donovan.

The medals were presented at the Dufferin Hotel on Saturday night by Mayor Fisher.

Among the skaters and officials who left for their homes yesterday were Harry Kasky, Canadian and United States champion; W. Smith of Montreal, Russell Wheeler of Montreal, W. G. Bratton of Pittsburgh, W. C. Fischer of Johnson City, William G. Bratton of Montreal, William Irvine of Montreal, and Joe Page of Montreal.

It was estimated that the total attendance during the three days of the big meet was between 40,000 and 50,000 in spite of the driving snow on the first day and the almost zero weather on the second and third.

So soon as the three mile race was over Mayor Fisher presented to Charles Jewtraw a handsome seventeen-jewel gold case, Howard watch, bearing inscription: "Presented to (here is a blank space where the winner's name will be inserted), International Amateur Skating Champion, by the City of St. John, N. B., February, 1923."

In making the presentation the mayor said that he took great pleasure in thus expressing the good wishes of the citizens of this city towards Jewtraw. He declared that the win had been a well earned one and he knew that every one would be glad to welcome him back here again next winter. Three hearty cheers were given for Charles Jewtraw and the latter thanked the citizens for the splendid reception which they had accorded him during his stay here. He expressed his happiness in carrying out his cherished ambition, by capturing the international title, and he closed by announcing that the memory of the big meet here would remain fresh in his mind so long as he lived.

A battery of photographers secured pictures of the new champion excepting the watch from the mayor and after being congratulated by Miss Canada. The winner was then hoisted on the shoulders of a few enthusiastic followers and carried to the club house. A sonnet photograph donated by the photographer Salton, King Square, for the skater winning the international title, was presented Charles Jewtraw by Miss Canada with a few words of congratulation. Jewtraw made a fitting reply. While none of the international titles were captured by St. John skaters, the citizens still have reason to be proud of their showing against the pick of the American continent. Charlie Gorman deserves great credit for his splendid work throughout the various meets and it is really his work during the last three years that has enabled the citizens of St. John to witness the big cham-

ampionship events which they saw contested for on Lily Lake on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday.

Gorman's record has been a good one even if he did not capture any of the three major titles. He finished second only to the international champion in the Adirondack Cup series. He was well up in every event during all the circuit meets and it is said that Gorman's elimination in the semi-finals of the half mile on Saturday was only the third or fourth time all season that he had failed to reach the final. Gorman's work has placed him on a par with the best skating champions that this city has ever produced.

Frank Gorman's work also deserves mention as he was always out there trying hard and, while his showing here was not so impressive owing to the fact that he returned home from the circuit in poor health, Frank skated some excellent races this season at the various meets.

Will Logan, Edgar Snodgrass and many other junior skaters have earned a reputation for this city as the home of fast skaters and it will be surprising indeed if a future international champion is not to be found among this promising crop.

After the 440 yards' final, J. T. Fitzgerald, president of the I. S. U., called "Bobby" Lee, of St. John, to the center, praising him for the way he raced and said he would send him a pair of skates.
