

WOMAN TEACHES MANY LANGUAGES

Alice Werner is Lecturer in School of Oriental Studies, London.

LONDON, June 4.—Lecturing in the School of Oriental Studies, in London, every day, is a charming, gray-haired woman professor who can impart the knowledge of more languages than probably any other person. Professor Alice Werner, a Fellow of Newnham College, through her perfect grip of three key languages in the Bantu group and her lesser knowledge of three more, is able to teach the dialects of 300 peoples who populate the vast continent of Africa from the shores of British East to the slopes of Natal and the interior of Zululand—the greater part of Africa south of the equator.

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ham College, Cambridge, Professor Werner spent 10 years in Journalism, and then visited Africa for three years. A later visit of two years was devoted to research work among the coast tribes of British East Africa. Apart from her great knowledge of the curious African tongues, Professor Werner confessed to a remarkable acquaintance-

ship with the languages of Europe. She is an authority on the Pakome tribe, who are thought to be the only people who eat crocodiles.

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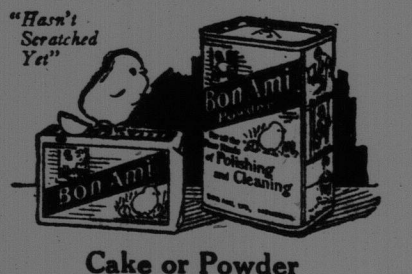
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
