NOW WEYLER HAS RESIGNED

Commander of the Spanish Forces in Cuba Has Also Got His Back Up.

Angry at His Government's Release of the Imprisoned American, Sanguilly.

Speculation as to Who Will Succeed Weyler in the Cuban Campaign.

New York, March 1.—Stephen Bonsal writes the Herald from Havana that he is informed on the very highest authority that Captain-General Weyler has forwarded his resignation to the Spanish government at Madrid. The captain general will leave the island as soon as possible, probably in about two weeks. This decisive step General Weyler determined to take as soon as he heard of the release of Julio Sanguilly. The captain general frequently said he would resign if the crown should interfere in his policy in regard to prisoners, especially American; and he was incensed, I am told, beyond measure by being ignored in the negotiations carried on by the Spanish government. It is reported that General Ruman Blanco Arenas or Marquis Pena Plata may be appointed to succeed General Weyler.
