

# OF NOVA SCOTA

MONTREAL, Jan. 27.—Two men lost their lives and four horses were suffocated in a blaze which broke out at an early hour this morning in the stable of George W. Cooke of Westmount. The dead men are John Cromier, coachman, who is said to be a native of Amherst, N. S., and Wm. Douglas, a stableman. Cromier evidently lost his life in an attempt to rescue a valuable horse belonging to

Both men slept in one room over the stable proper and could have made their escape from a second story window. The supposition is that Cromier after calling to his companion to get up, ran down stairs to rescue the horses, and was then overcome by the smake.

At any rate his body was found close to the street door, which was shut to, but not locked, with the valuable horse lying dead a few feet away.

Douglas was found dead in bed. The fire lasted only half an hour and was quickly extinguished on a call to the brigade.


