

THE 62nd REGIMENT WILL GO TO QUEBEC

Latest Orders Call For
Full Strength of This
Unit But No Additional
Pay Granted.

Composite Companies Will Go
From Nearly All The Other
New Brunswick Regiments
—Twelve Thousand From
Eastern Canada

OTTAWA, June 14.—Military orders have been issued for the mobilization of some 12,000 of the Canadian militia at Quebec during the centenary celebration under command of Brigadier General Otter. The troops will represent every branch of Canada's forces, but will be confined to Eastern Canada with the exception of a contingent of 175 of all ranks and 10 horses to be selected from the several units in the three military districts from Winnipeg west.

The city corps selected to go to Quebec are the following:

From Toronto—Queen's Own Rifles, 48th Highlanders and 10th Royal Grenadiers.

From Montreal—Victoria Rifles, Royal Scots Highlanders and 68th Carabiniers.

From Ottawa—The Governor General's Foot Guards and the 43rd Regiment.

From London—The 17th Fusiliers.

From Hamilton—The 17th Regiment and the 51st Highlanders.

From Kingston—14th Regiment.

From Windsor—The 2nd Essex Fusiliers.

From St. John—The 62nd Fusiliers.

From Halifax—The 62nd Regiment and the 68th Fusiliers.

One company each, consisting of 40 all ranks, will be sent from the following:

1st Prince of Wales Fusiliers, Montreal.

18th Regiment, Belleville.

19th Regiment, St. Catharines.

22nd Regiment, Woodstock.

24th Regiment, Chatham.

25th Regiment, St. Thomas.

38th Dufferin Rifles, Brantford.

41st Regiment, Brockville Rifles.

63rd Sherbrooke Regiment.

67th Peterborough Regiment.

68th St. Hyacinthe Regiment.

88th Three Rivers Regiment.

Each of the thirty-eight regiments will go 500 strong, including all ranks, with the exception of the Queen's Own Rifles, Toronto, which will be 400 strong. They are ordered to arrive in Quebec on July 20th.

From each of the 62 rural corps of eastern Canada there will be one company consisting of 45 of all ranks. These corps will include the following:

These companies will report at Quebec July 18th.

The garrison artillery from the city corps will be drawn from the following: 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 7th regiments, 62 all ranks, the Coburg Co., 2nd York Regiment.

The permanent force will be represented by three officers and 60 cadets from the Royal Military College, A and B batteries, R. C. G. MONITOR TORPEDOED
IN NAVAL TEST

Big Hole in Her Side Only Gives Her a
List of Seventeen Inches.

FORT MONROE, Va., June 13.—Pierced with an American Whitehead torpedo carrying a charge of gun cotton which tore a big hole in her side, the United States Monitor Florida now at rest in the dry dock at the Norfolk Navy yard, a victim of a naval experiment to test the vessel's turret from torpedo attack of water tight bulkheads. The water in the turret her a list of seventeen inches to starboard. The test took place off Pine Beach near the Jamestown exposition grounds, where the monitor was anchored in fifteen feet of water. The naval officials while admitting the damage done to the vessel is very serious declared it is not dangerous.

The test was witnessed by a number of officials including Secretaries McCall and Taft, Westmaster General Meyer and ordnance officers of the navy and army.

NEW YORK SORE OVER
WHITE STAR WITHDRAWAL

Produce Exchange Will Try to Get Them
Back Again to That Port.

NEW YORK, June 15.—The withdrawal from service of the freight ships of the White Star Line, and the complaint of the company that the railroads have so discriminated against New York that the grain of the country is being sent abroad by way of Montreal, will be thoroughly gone into by the New York Produce Exchange next Thursday, when its trade and transportation committee will submit a report on the subject which is expected to recommend the appointment of a committee to confer with the railroads.

"New York should be the natural shipping point of the grain of the country," said President Ring of the Exchange, "and there seems to be no other reason for the grain being sent to Montreal, than that the railroads are giving that port lower rates than they are giving New York. They are handling the grain and all the terminals are in good shape to admit of its handling. The railroads have plenty of cars and engines." Mr. Ring said that everything that could be done would be done by his associates to bring back the business to this city.

THE BENGORE HEAD
NOT SERIOUSLY INJURED

SOUTHAMPTON, June 15.—The British steamer Bengore Head, which ran amuck in Portsmouth harbor yesterday afternoon, carrying away part of the upper works of the battleship Vanguard, finally grounding in the mud, is now in dry dock here. The damage to her bows is not considered serious.

SMALLPOX PATIENTS -IN BAD STATE

Twenty-Six at the Halifax Hospital and
No Medical Attendant

(Halifax Echo)

A deploable state of affairs is said to exist at the Halifax Hospital. The Echo is informed that there are 26 cases there today, with no resident doctor. There is a policeman in charge, but he does not pretend to be possessed of any degree of medical skill.

Many of the patients are children. This morning an old lady from the North End was admitted. Her case is said to be a pitiable one. The C. M. O., the Echo is informed, visits the Hospital, but does not go beyond the gate. Some of the patients stated that they are advised by an alderman to consult their own doctors. If this is the case, it is a poor way to stamp out the disease.

CONVENTION DELEGATES
MAKE CHICAGO LIVELY

Arriving in Large Numbers—Hawaiians

CHICAGO, June 14.—The Californians came at noon, headed by Mr. H. De Young, chairman 15 of the delegates. NEW YORK CANNOT
COMPETE WITH MONTREAL

White Star Line Withdraws Freight Service
—Claim Railroads Discriminate in
Favor of Montreal.

NEW YORK, June 13.—The freight service of the White Star Line steamers from the port of New York will be discontinued on Tuesday and the five freight steamers will be laid off. According to the officials of the line the railroads "favor Montreal over New York in fixing freight rates. This announcement was made by Mr. Jeffrey said the steamers will be kept in dock until the railroads make the same favorable rates for this city as for Montreal.

CARACAS STRICKEN BY EUBONIC PLAGUE

No Measures Taken to Fight the Disease
and Great Alarm is Felt.

CARACAS, June 14, via Willemstad, June 15.—Several cases of eubonic plague have occurred here within the last few days indicating that the city was being widely contaminated with the disease. Great alarm is felt because no measures have been taken as yet to fight the plague in this city and there are no serums on hand. The railroad running from Lagaria opened today, passengers coming from that city, being required to undergo a five days' quarantine.

No action has been taken as yet by the diplomatic representatives of the foreign powers, although a meeting was held yesterday by these officials to consider the situation. Foreign interests here and in other places throughout Venezuela are greatly alarmed because of lack of sanitary measures and because of a decree issued by President Castro recently, declaring that the epidemic was ended. The president and his wife remain in the city.

VOLCANO OUTBURST
ON SAMOAN ISLANDS

AUCKLAND, New Zealand, June 15.—Advices received here state that for three nights beginning May 19 there was a remarkable volcanic outburst on Savaii, the largest of the Samoan Islands. The first eruption was followed by the greatest flow of lava in the history of the island it being estimated at nearly three thousand tons per minute. Soon there was almost continuous sheet of lava 8 miles wide and from 6 inches to 6 feet deep flowing down the mountain side. It overflowed the mountain and destroyed many native houses in its way, dropping into the ocean and causing an immense uprising of steam.

TOMMY BURNS AND BILL
SQUIRES WILL FIGHT

SYDNEY, N. S. W., June 15.—A sporting syndicate here has arranged for a fight between Tommy Burns, the heavyweight pugilist, and Bill Squires, the Australian fighter. The contest will be for a purse of \$14,000, and is to take place in this city during the visit of the American battleship fleet next August.

The syndicate last month deposited \$10,000 to bind a match between Burns and Lang, an Australian boxer, who was defeated by Jack Johnson at Melbourne last year.

DUTCH SLOOPS DETAINED
BY VENEZUELA VESSEL

WILLEMSTAD, Island of Curacao, June 15.—Two Dutch sloops, the "Carnegie," plying between Aruba, a Dutch island near the coast of Venezuela and Curacao, have been detained by a Venezuelan guard vessel on the high seas off Lavela de Coro, the seaport of Venezuela on the Gulf of Coro. The sloops were stopped by the "Carnegie" and the Venezuelan vessel obliged to proceed to Coro, where they were detained for two days. All letters outside of mail bags on board the Dutch sloops were retained by the Venezuelan authorities.

ATTENDED ANNIVERSARY

SARAGOSSA, June 15.—King Alfonso and Mr. Cruppi, the French Minister of Commerce attended the commemorative today of the hundredth anniversary of the defense of the city against Napoleon's army. The king was exceptionally enthusiastic at the reception which was accorded him by the multitude.

GETTING MORE MONEY

SYDNEY, June 15.—The Dominion Iron and Steel Company have purchased half the property known as the Collins Farm, in the vicinity of the Collins River, in the state of New South Wales. It is believed that the object of the purchase is to allow the company latitude to ultimately increase its blast furnace plant.

KISSING THE FEET.

The custom of kissing the feet of persons who it was desired to honor originated with the ancients. The people of oriental nations used to kiss the hands and feet or hems of the clothes of the persons they wished to show respect for. The ancient Egyptians took this custom from the Assyrians, and later the Greeks adopted the habit from the Egyptians.
