ENGLAND AND THE UNITED STATES.

The occurrence of any thing to cause a flood between the United States and Great Britain at this time, if growing out of Government action, affords a singular contrast to the numerous instances of friendship that Americans have experienced at the hands of Englishmen during the last four or five years. The manner in which the sick crew of the "Lancaster" were received spontaneously by the English naval authorities, may well be allowed to offset a dozen instances of the most ignorant men acting under orders which they do not fully understand. The conduct of the Hereditaries towards the John Gilpin is another noble instance of English humanity developing itself for the benefit of America.

There was a war, and an American regiment was in danger of being lost with her, it is the relationship that stood by her and gave that moral encouragement and active assistance that worked to the saving of so many American lives. It is a short time since the commandant of a British man-of-war threatened to bring his guns to bear upon a town in San Francisco, if the authorities of that port would not make an arrangement with him, and the indifference might be termed of the same kind as showing that the English do not best themselves hostilely towards us, not as brethren. We think these things should be taken into the sum when Americans make up their accounts with England, and that it is silly on our parts to look only at the black side of things, and to convey the opinion that England looks upon us with abhorrence.—Boston Traveler.
