

THIS POTATO QUESTION

Extract from "DAILY EXPRESS" To the Editor of the "DAILY EXPRESS" From SIR JAMES DUNN, Bt.

There is a potato famine in England, and throughout Europe generally the potato crop is short. Canada, on the other hand, has its usual bountiful and cheap in the Dominion, but our Government prohibits Canadian potatoes because Canada has the Colorado beetle and we fear the insect might be introduced into this country with the Canadian potato.

The beetle eats the leaves of the potato plant, and if not removed in time kills the root. The Canadian has learned how to destroy this pest and the crop in Canada does not suffer.

France has the Colorado beetle, too, and so we have decided to exclude French potatoes, but only after the middle of next March. The Ministry sees no danger of the beetle coming in with French potatoes in the winter months, as it hibernates in the cold weather. The beetle has the same habits in Canada, except that on account of the greater cold it hibernates longer in Canada than in France.

If it is safe to bring potatoes from France till the middle of March it is equally safe to bring them from Canada till the middle of May, as the Canadian potato plant is not in leaf till late June.

The Government should at once suspend the ban on Canadian potatoes until the middle of March at least.

This decision would ensure a plentiful supply of potatoes and remove the menace of the famine.

HOUSE PROGRAM IS CONSIDERED

Premier Richards Declines to Comment on New Revenue Rumors

Fredericton, Feb. 9. — At the conclusion here this morning of a lengthy Provincial Government meeting, Premier C.D. Richards had nothing to give out other than that pre-cessional matters were discussed. The meeting will continue today.

It is being talked in Capital circles that certain important measures are being considered to increase help meet the deficit. The Premier's revenue of the province and to today, however, declared that it was impossible for him to make any comment or statement in this regard.

Among the measures which, usually well-informed sources say, are being discussed, are an increase of one cent in the gasoline tax, a motor carrier tax and a provincial income tax. It is whispered, too, that soon New Brunswick will see beer and light wines served in hotels and clubs, a step which, if instituted, would greatly increase the revenues of the province, it was felt.

Some suggest, also, that the Government may consider the operation of beer gardens throughout the province, similar to privately-operated ones in Quebec. In connection with all these topics, however, the Premier declined to comment.

An order concerning a pre-Confederation grant of \$50,000 to the credit of the province in Ottawa, and if it might be possible to draw from this, Premier Richards was non-committal. It is understood that in 1932 this was drawn on the same extent by the Government of that time.

AUTOMOTIVE WORLD

CAR SALES ENCOURAGING

The cars for 1932 are passing through the probation period with flying colors. The critical test of the New York Motor Show revealed that Canada, shows have been held at Montreal, Winnipeg and Windsor, the principal event being the Eastern Canada show at Montreal. Attendance at Montreal was greater than in 1931 and interest in the new cars was noticeably better; so much so that sales of cars were reported by exhibiting manufacturers as "quite satisfactory."

FEW EXHIBITORS IN 1908

An old-timer in the industry recalls the earliest motor shows held in Canada. Consulting records for 1908, he finds that the Canadian manufacturers who exhibited at the Automobile Show held in March in the St. Lawrence Avenue, Toronto, were only four in number. They were Canada Cycle and Motor Co., Ford Motor Company, Oldsmobile Company of St. Catharines, and the Laughlin Motor Car Company of Oshawa.

TO LINK TWO GREAT PARKS

Work on a highway that will link Jasper National Park and Banff National Park in the Canadian Rocky Mountains a distance of nearly two hundred miles, has begun. The country, through which the new highway will pass is at present comparatively little known, and with the exception of a few game wardens, unpopulated. The journey from Lake Louise to Jasper at present is possible by pack train over an old Indian trail. The route of the highway will be one of unparalleled scenic beauty, and offers an alternative mountain route to the many tourists now visiting Banff and Jasper. Both of the latter places are noted for their splendid accommodation for tourists and their variety of attractions. Jasper National Park covers an area of approximately 4,200 square miles and Banff Park 2,586 square miles.

Here and There

LONGEST PRODUCE TRAIN BETWEEN HALIFAX-MONTREAL. Montreal, February, 8 — Distribution of the largest single consignment of West Indian fruit and produce which has ever reached Canada was made from Montreal to the principal cities and towns of Ontario and Quebec and to points as far west as Winnipeg.

66 carloads of bananas, coconuts, oranges and tomatoes were rushed to Montreal in C. N. R. refrigerator cars from the docks at Halifax where they were loaded from the Canadian National steamer "Lady Rodney."

Forty nine cars, containing the bananas and tomatoes, came through as a single unit, one of the longest produce trains ever moved by the railway between the two cities. The remaining cars, containing the oranges and coconuts, were handled by regular freight trains.

According to the local dealers the tomatoes were among the finest ever to reach the city from the Bahamas and the fruit reached market in prime condition. A large part of the shipment was absorbed in Montreal; the remainder was distributed to Toronto, Ottawa, Quebec, Windsor, Sherbrooke, Hamilton, Winnipeg and other cities. Several additional carloads remained in the Maritimes to meet local needs.

"ASPIRIN" BARRED

Ottawa. — Collectors of National Revenue have been notified by departmental headquarters here that goods imported for sale bearing the word or trade mark "Aspirin" are prohibited importation into Canada. It is explained that the prohibition results from the Court decision under which one firm was granted the right to use the word or trade mark "Aspirin" on its product when sold in Canada. In order to insure that products which are not entitled to use the trade mark, according to the decision of the courts, do not get into the Canadian market from abroad, it has been decided to prohibit their entry.

HEADLIGHTS BLINK AND GARAGE DOORS OPEN

By means of the headlights' glare a garage door they now swing open penetrating a small glass window in automatically. This operation is brought about by the beam of the headlight penetrating the little glass window in the garage door and striking the light-sensitive surface of a photoelectric tube to a degree sufficient to actuate a relay which operates the regular electric door opening mechanism. When the door has been opened it remains open until the closing button has been pushed — in other words, the door does not close automatically. Once closed, however, it is again ready to open as soon as a headlight glare strikes the little window.

A contract has been let for about 2,000,000 feet of hardwood timber at Belmont, N. S. while the cut for New Brunswick is estimated at 125,000,000 feet.
