Two more men are looming large in connection with the Canadian Marathon Derby, to be run at the Island on May 1st. The victory of Fred Meadows over John D. Marsh makes him look like a man who ought to have a good chance in the big contest. Meadows may have made his reputation as a five-miler, but it will be remembered that he ran third in the Ward Marathon last October, and with careful training has increased his powers of endurance this spring. His defeat by Dorando Gainsi at the recent mile race, however, has caused many people to remember only his work as a five-miler, but it now looks as though he may break into the Marathon game with success. The runner who defeated Marsh at 12 miles should be heard from again.

The second man is Caesar Guala, an Italian, whose entry was the last one received. Guala is a waiter at the King Edward Hotel, and comes into professional ranks without any reputation as an amateur. He is training hard however, and without figures to show what he can do he cannot be left out of the reckoning, for there is just a chance that he may prove the dark horse of the race, as St. Yves did in New York.

It would seem that basketball as played in New Brunswick, would compare very favorably with that played in Ontario. The Ottawa Y. M. C. A. holds the city championship of the Dominion capital and ranks high among Upper Canadian teams. The fact that the team is on an extended tour places it at a disadvantage. It is to be hoped that a Maritime Province team may be able to travel far afield next season and try conclusions with quintettes in other parts of Canada.

## NEW ROWING ASSOCIATION WILL WORK WITH M.P.A.A.A.

The Acadian Recorder intimates that the new rowing association for the Maritime Provinces will work hand in hand with the M. P. A. A. A., for the advancement of amateur sport.

The Recorder has the following:  
"The association is not antagonistic to the M. P. A. A. A., but while not being in membership with that body, will assist them in their object of keeping amateur sport pure, and at the same time reducing some of their labors, and they can thus devote more of their time to athletic sport."

It is expected that the association will be in running order this season. One purpose urged for organization is the necessity of competent officials at regattas where so much fraud property is in their hands and jeopardized by persons in control who are unfamiliar with rules and conditions.

**To Affiliate With C. A. A. O.**  
It was decided to approach the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen to find out on what basis application with that body could be

effected. If it be satisfactory such an application will be entered into, providing the Canadian Association renders its claim to Maritime Provinces jurisdiction except through the new Association. It was announced at the meeting that President Lithgow has made application to the C. A. A. O. for affiliation to the M. P. A. A. A. though such action was not decided upon by his executive. It was felt, however, that the C. A. O. would not affiliate an athletic body, its jurisdiction being solely over rowing interests. Mr. Lithgow wrote the Canadian Association that he hoped Halifax would be represented at St. Catharines this year by two scullers and possibly by a four, and that they would go from there to Detroit to race at the National.

Phillip McGuire and Messrs. Harris, Tobin and Gowen were appointed a committee to draft constitution and by-laws to be submitted to a meeting to be called by the chairman about two weeks hence, by which time it is expected St. John and Toronto will have been heard from.

## MORE CONCERNING PEACE CONFERENCE AT TORONTO

The Toronto Telegram, the only Toronto paper which dealt seriously with the Federation-C. A. A. U. peace conference had the following to say:

"At the St. Charles last night Dr. F. Steen, Leslie Boyd, K. C. Brown, and T. H. Brown, of the Federation and the Montreal A. C., which are the same thing, met a party representing the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union. The easterners came up with a view to patching up a peace, and the conference, without coming to any decision other than finding that each side is not as bad as painted—at any rate as individuals—broke up to meet at an early date again."

**Point at Issue.**  
"It is stated that the Federation officials wish to have their rules of professional and amateurs mixing held away in those games now committed to the principle—lacrosse, hockey and baseball. They argue that these games are hopelessly beyond the pale of the old and stricter amateur rule and they would recognize this mixing as is done in cricket and golf now in all associations."

"However little progress was made last night the fact that the Montreal men proposed and came to such a conference, and that the Federation peace down east, and a second meeting may develop something."

"Out of lacrosse, the Montreal A. A. U. would be easily induced to rejoin the C. A. A. U."

"It is difficult to bring this principle to bear under the C. A. A. U. rule, which is the orthodox one and there is no likelihood of their ever agreeing to it."

"The C. A. A. U. officials went into the conference with the visitors as Montreal A. A. A. men without recognizing them as Federation officers or the existence of that body."

"With that as a start and nothing for the C. A. A. U. to do but stick to their amateur definition or drop out of all games practically, but athletes there seems little chance of coming together."

"One or the other must surrender, and the Montreal A. A. A. is pretty well committed to the Federation principle as members of the Lacrosse Union."

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## SACKVILLE WILL NOT BE ON CIRCUIT

Those enterprising newspaper men who started the story that Sackville will be on the horse racing circuit again this summer were just a few minutes previous. As a matter of fact, it is not expected here that Sackville will be on the circuit at all. Last year the circuit races were very not successful from a financial point of view and the local men are not likely to try the venture again this season.

What will probably be done here will be to hold a number of smaller meetings which will help to develop the speeders in this vicinity, and will prove of considerable interest, if the results of similar meetings last year may be taken as a reliable basis for expectations. But circuit races are not for Sackville this year, unless present plans are changed considerably—Sackville Tribune.

## ST. LAWRENCE BUSINESS OF THE C.P.R. WILL BE LARGE THIS YEAR; STAFF LEAVING ST. JOHN OFFICES

Captain Walsh, of the C. P. R., completed his duties here on Sunday with the departure of the Empress of Britain, and left for Montreal last evening. Mr. C. Pollard, who has been chief clerk in the shore captain's office here, leaves today for Quebec to open the summer office there.

Captain Walsh said last evening that the St. Lawrence business of the C. P. R. would be very large this year. This was to be particularly true of the London service, to which was to be devoted berths number 3 and number 10 of the King Edward pier.

The Mount Temple, which is the first London-Bristol boat to sail from this side on the summer schedule, will take away 8,000 tons dead weight, which is equal to a cargo of 12,000 tons.

During the season now opening the C. P. R. will have control of the entire King Edward pier, as berth 8 had been added to berths 7, 9 and 10, the company's former holdings.

Captain Walsh spoke of the winter's business at this port as having been of quite satisfactory proportions. Between 300,000 and 400,000 tons of cargo had been taken from here by the Canadian Pacific boats.

The Empress of Ireland will reach Quebec on April 30th, inaugurating the summer schedule. The Lake Erie and the Montezuma are the only two of the company's boats which have yet to clear from this port. After the sailing of the Montezuma the men employed here in connection


with the London service will remove to Quebec.

After giving her final winter port services here, which will be in assisting the Lake Erie, the ocean-going tug Cruiser will be taken around to the St. Lawrence by Captain Elliot.
