**BUSINESS IN PORTLAND.**

The Liberal papers frequently delight in publishing items to indicate that Portland is doing a wonderful business in the trans-Atlantic steamship business. It appears that while traffic is heavy at St. John just now it is not overabundant in the Port City. The Portland Argus says:

"Business was very quiet at the Grand Truck docks yesterday, the only steamer trying being the Thomson liner Devona, which is expected to leave late this afternoon for a French port with about 750 horses and mules in addition to grain and some general cargo. There are at the present time some half dozen steamers fully due here from various European ports."
