WEST END MAN LOSES ARM BY ACCIDENT IN SAW MILL

Charles J. Stackhouse Victim of Shocking Misadventure in Randolph & Baker Mill Yesterday Afternoon—Now in Hospital in Critical Condition.

Charles Joseph Stackhouse, a carpenter, residing at 57 Market Place, West St. John, was the victim of a serious accident while working in the Randolph & Baker sawmill at Randolph about three o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mr. Stackhouse is not the regular millwright, but was employed by the firm to put in new conveyors. As usual the rules, he attempted to do some work on a sawdust chain while the chain was revolving about a pulley. With the result that his left arm was caught in the chain and he was drawn up against the pulley and dangerously injured. It is said that the arm was badly mangled, and the man immediately picked up, but it was feared that he would not survive to reach the General Public Hospital. He was attended by Dr. J. H. Allingham of Manawagonish Road, and Dr. W. L. Ellis, of West St. John. It was 8:30 o'clock last evening when he was removed from the operating room in the hospital, where it was found necessary to amputate the left arm just above the elbow. A report from the hospital last night was to the effect that Mr. Stackhouse went through the operation very well but his injuries are so severe, his case is looked on as most critical. At last midnight his condition was reported fair, but he was still in a most dangerous state. Mr. Stackhouse has a wife and a grown family in West St. John, and one son, James C. Stackhouse, is at present at the front, having gone overseas with the first contingent. The injured man is a son of the late Alderman James O. Stackhouse, and is one of the most prominent citizens on the western side of the harbor. The accident was learned with the deepest regret by his numerous friends.

Son of Rev. J. H. Jenner of West St. John Has Been Admitted to Hospital at Birmingham.

Rev. J. H. Jenner, pastor of Charlotte street Baptist church, West St. John, last evening received a telegram from the militia department, Ottawa, informing him that his son, Sergeant H. B. Jenner of the 5th Nova Scotia regiment, had been severely wounded on June 26th, being hit by the explosion of a shell, and had been injured internally. He has been admitted to the hospital at Birmingham, England. The wounded soldier has a wife and one child residing in Truro, N. S. Sergeant Jenner enlisted with the 25th Battalion at Halifax in December, 1914, as a private, and being specially expert in marksmanship, was soon promoted to the rank of sergeant. The wounded sergeant's grandfather, and father of Rev. Mr. Jenner, was a non-commissioned officer with the 72nd Highland Regiment which was the last imperial regiment to be stationed in St. John. Ptes. John E. P. and J. Boyle Tracey. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Tracey, Richmond street, received word from Ottawa this morning that their two sons were reported missing since June 2. John E. P. Tracey enlisted with the 5th Mounted Rifles and left for overseas last summer. He was twenty-one years of age and was employed at Wissel's store, Union street. His brother, James Boyle, aged nineteen years, went with him. He had worked with J. Flood & Sons, contractors, for some time, and his health failing, spent a year in Fredericton before enlisting. The missing boys have three young brothers attending school, as well as one sister, Miss Helena, at home. Mr. Tracey is a well-known mason and his wife was formerly Miss Helena DeLoach, Fredericton. J. Boyle & Sons of that city are relatives.

A WESTFIELD MAN KILLED BY LIGHTNING

Joseph Nelson Struck While Working at Wilson Mill—Death Instantaneous.

A gloom was cast over the community at Westfield yesterday afternoon when the news was circulated that Joseph Nelson had lost his life while at his work in the Wilson mill by being struck by lightning. He was attending one of the runs which carry the boards from the mill to the yard where they are piled. When the boards stopped coming the men in the yard started to investigate and found Mr. Nelson's body where he had fallen when the lightning struck him. He was about sixty-seven years of age and made his home with his daughter, Mrs. James Lyon. The coroner was called but did not consider an inquest necessary. He is survived by three sons and four daughters. The funeral arrangements will be made later.

JAMES H. DODDY DIED AT EARLY HOUR TODAY

Prominent Citizen Succumbs to Heart Failure After Two Weeks' Illness.

The many friends of James H. Doddy will learn with regret of his death which took place this morning about two o'clock at his residence, 17 Pagan Place. The deceased leaves besides his wife, four sons and one daughter. The sons are Harry, Frank, Edmund and F. J. Doddy, the daughter is Miss Norah. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon from the late residence at 2:30 o'clock. Mr. Doddy had been ailing with heart trouble for the past two years but has only been confined to his home for the last two weeks. He was a prominent plumbing contractor, a member of the Board of Trade, and one of the most prominent residents of St. John.
