If the progress of the Gospel among the Free Christian Baptist Churches in New Brunswick during the year ending July 1st, 1856.

In accordance with this an your Secretary proceeds to present you with the present Report. Ithough he deeply regrets that from several District Meetings he has seeived no Report, and also from several of his brethren in the Minisy he has had no communication, and therefore any defects or omisons may not be attributable to neglect on his part, but to a want of a sources, which have failed him.
