Independent Cassette Releases

Varoshi Fame (6 song demi cassette)

VF is one of Canada's few industrial bands. Rhythms are thrashed out on piping, oxygen tanks, beer kegs, a bathtub and everything else that's metalic including a kitchen sink. Added to this are noise effects from guitar, bass, synthesizer and tape, while vocal conveying an antiauthoritarian and politically conscious message are shouted over the primitive driving beat. VF excells in live performance where the trio strives to make the audience think and dance. This cassette, compiled from VF performances, fails to capture the group's on-stage energy, but serves well in spreading the sound of VF. > John Newlands - Rain (Reel Life)

Ave., Toronto ON, M6G 2W4)

On Newland's third cassette release, this self taught musician plays all instruments. With a peculiar song-writing style, starting with vocals and then adding rhythms, Newlands believes conventional songwriting methods usually lead to conventional songs. However, songs on 'Rain' are notably more conventional than previous efforts, leading the listener to wonder what Newland's next piece might sound like.

Production though is top quality. Gabriel - like vocals add a great deal to the music, yet most songs lack a vital energy. "Put up a Picture" and the instrumental "Bravo 20" are the outstanding pieces

Newlands is still an talented undeniably songwriter and is definitely worth watching as a developing talent.
