4. The principal foodstuffs, the import of which into the United Kingdom might have to be controlled in the event of a major war, are—

Wheat and other cereals, including rice, barley, and oats;

Meat, including beef, mutton and lamb, pork, bacon, and livestock;

Sugar:

Butter, cheese, processed milks and eggs;

Oilseeds and nuts;

Fish, including canned salmon;

Tea.

5. The attached table showing the imports of the above-named commodities into the United Kingdom in 1935, gives an indication of the exportable surplus of these commodities in the different Dominions and India in relation to United Kingdom requirements. In the case of oilseeds and nuts, vegetable oils, sugar, and tea there is also a substantial import from the Colonial Empire.

6. In the Great War, His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom undertook to purchase the whole of the exportable surplus of certain foodstuffs from the Dominions, the price being determined by negotiation from time to time. In other cases, contracts were arranged for the purchase by the United Kingdom of specified quantities at an agreed price. In the event of a major war in the future, the United Kingdom might consider it desirable to propose arrangements on similar lines to those followed in 1914–1918, i.e., according to circumstances, either (i) to undertake to purchase the whole of the exportable surplus of a particular product for a certain period, or, alternatively, (ii) to negotiate for bulk purchases at intervals as the war progressed, when the quantity and price could both be determined in accordance with the circumstances existing at the time of the negotiation.
