- 1 lb. turnip seed (Sweede)
- 1 oz. early cabbage seed
- 1 oz. cabbage (late Savoy)
- 2 ozs. beet
- 2 ozs. lettuce.

Above to be sent by parcel post about the middle of December to Hudson's Bay Company, Trout Lake, care of Canadian Airways, Sioux Lookout, Ont.

The following supply of clothing for the real needy should be forwarded to Reverend Leslie Garrett, Trout Lake, care of Hudson's Bay Company, Fort Churchill, not later than May 15th, 1934:-

- 3 bolts Galatea (for women's dresses)
- 1 bolt Gingham (for babies' clothes)
- 1 bolt Flannelette (for babies' underwear)
- 3 bolts Duck for boys and men's trousers
- 2 dozen men's woollen socks
- 2 dozen women's woollen socks
- 2 dozen suits underwear (2 pieces)
- 3 dozen shirts.
