

Q. You mean 2 o'clock in the morning?
A. a.m.

Q. You have mentioned about somebody coming in?
A. (No answer)

Q. Do you know the name of this man?
A. His name is Vogel, and he lived here in Naaldwijk.

Q. Once the man was dead did you prepare any paper in reference to that?
A. The Death Paper were written.

Q. What was done with this Death Certificate?
A. What I remember of it?

Q. What do you usually do with it?
A. We write two papers, one for statistics and one for the town and that is the Death Papers and I gave you one of them

(Prosecutor shows witness a Death Certificate)

Wit: That is the one for the town.

Q. Will you produce it to the Court?
A. It is in Dutch.

Q. You can translate it?
A. Oh! yes.

JA: Is that a signed document?

Wit: Yes

JA: Let him establish that and produce it to the Court.

Prosecutor continues

Q. Is that your signature?
A. Yes sir.

JA: Ask him to read that and the interpreter will translate in English. Let us get this thing organized.

Wit Int: Death Certificate. The signer declares that he has personally witnessed that on the 21st May 1945 in the age of 28 years has died Vogels, Leonardus Petrus, and that the cause of his death was a gun shot wound in the belly and breast. There is suspicion of death by violent action.

Death Certificate marked Exhibit "K" signed by the President and attached to the proceedings.

Q. I show you what is marked as Exhibit "K". When a person dies in the hospital at which you are a doctor do you always make out one of these that I present to you?
A. Yes the doctor does always.

Q. Is that your signature?
A. Yes, you can see it.
