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REVOLUTION REPORTED IN
BERLIN

German Capital in An Uproar

Amsterdam, March 21.—(London Chronicle Despatch)—With revolution in the air, it is not surprising that rumors are running round that Germany's turn has come and that Berlin is in an uproar. One or two curious developments tend to support the possibility that unusual events are occurring there. Firstly, these rumors all appear to emanate from German unofficial quarters. Secondly, I have just spoken to a German Social Democrat who was on his way to the railway station enroute for Berlin. He said that he regarded the rumors as possibly partly true and, having large interests in Berlin, he felt it necessary to return there immediately in order to see the actual state of affairs, and to take steps to protect his interests.

There has been a curious ab-

sence of private letters from Berlin and Hamburg during the past few days. The newspapers here are taking a serious view of the rumors. Correspondents have gone to the frontier to endeavor to get information of what is proceeding. It may be that one of many hunger strikes, on perhaps a larger scale than ever before, is in progress, but from all available information it would seem by no means likely that any revolt in Berlin would have any chance of success among the old men who alone remains as civilians. Nevertheless after what the German army and the people have gone through during the past two years, it must not be entirely ruled out as impossible that part of the army at least might join with the the munition workers.

At the moment of telegraphing the latest tidings from the frontier are such as to suggest things are indeed grave. Though no details are given it is noteworthy that only two days ago official announcement was made throughout Germany of the raising by twenty per cent of the price of potatoes and other foodstuffs including rye and wheat.

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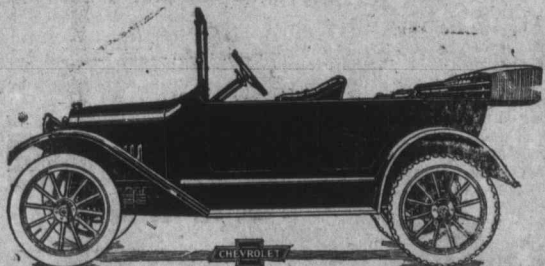
