The Money By-Law

Matters pertaining to school building advanced a step on Tuesday. Early in the evening the council met and passed a resolution declining to grant the money asked by the school board for building purposes, and at once gave the secretary of the board notice of their decision. Then the school board met and by resolution the secretary was instructed to request the council to submit a by-law to the ratepayers. This request the council "must" comply with. It will take probably five weeks to dispose of the by-law, three weeks to have plans prepared, and two weeks more to obtain tenders: so that the contract could not be let before July 5th. And this doesn't look very much like having the new building ready by Sept. 1st.

Easter Vestry

The annual Vestry Meeting of Christ Church (Anglican) was held on Monday at 7.30. A good number were present and considerable business was done. The officers for the ensuing year are: Wardens, Mr. Wm. Karley, Mr. Wm. J. Johnson; Sidesmen, Messrs. Jas. Ross, E. M. Fair, Stanley Rowsome, Ogle Webster, Wilfrid Green; Auditors, Messrs. Anthony Preston, Jas. Ross. The financial condition of the church is encouraging, and indications point to a progressive and successful year for 1905.

Mr. J. R. Dargavel, M.P.P., has had placed in the estimates for Colonization Roads the sum of \$500.00 for improving the Battersea, Jones' Falls and Morton road.

The death occurred at Berryton on April 11 of Mrs. Steven Carpenter, who had lived to reach the ripe old age of 83 years. She was born in Caintown, and after her marriage resided in Caintown settlement for a number of years.

Power has been given by the Railway committee of the House of Commons to a company to build a branch line of railway from Newboro to Ottawa. The company has two years to begin and three years more to complete the branch. Another branch is provided from Newboro to Montreal under the same conditions. The company obtained a charter in 1904 to run a line from Kingston to Georgian Bay and the new branches are extensions. The name of the company is changed to the Dominion Central from the Kingston and Dominion Central, which obtained a charter last year.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

A weak solution of alum or soda will revive the colors in a dusty carpet.

Equal parts of skimmed milk and water warmed will remove fly specks from varnished woodwork or furniture.

The doors, casings and surface of rooms when in natural finished wood should have an occasional rub with an oiled rag.

Oilcloth may be brightened by an occasional coat of varnish or by rubbing with kerosene once a month. Both treatments add to the durability of the oilcloth.

A room used for dancing should be well ventilated and well lighted—the ventilation for health's sake and the lighting to enhance the effect of the oilcloth.

It is well to remember when papering a small room that blue in all light shades makes a room look longer. Dark colors or papers with large patterns have the opposite effect.

The Wealthy Lord Durham.

Lord Durham, an enormously wealthy man, of cranky temper, but of the loftiest sense of honor, especially in everything relating to sport, is a great character in his way, and may be described as one of the watchdogs of the English racing world. He is fierce and relentless in his denunciation of anything that appears to be in the least bit crooked, or even suspicious, on the turf, and it may be remembered that by a memorable speech which he delivered some years ago at the Gimcrack Club dinner at York, calling into question the methods of the stable and of the running of the horses of Sir George Chetwynd, he virtually forced the Baronet to sue him for libel, with the result that Sir George was defeated and withdrew from the Jockey Club. Lord Durham was mainly responsible for the action of the club in declining to grant a license to Ted Sticks and to certain other American jockeys who had incurred the displeasure of the stewards, and is identified with a measure which has for its aim the abolition of the rule which permits assumed names to be registered. Lord Durham declares that there are over fifty race horse owners racing under assumed names, many of them with the object of deceiving either their creditors, their employers or their relatives. According to Lord Durham, the plan "encourages dishonesty," and he declares that "an assumed name on the turf is useful in the main to people whose character is so bad that they cannot race under their own names."
