THIS IRATE HUSBAND.

Makes a Target of a New York

Clergyman. The Min's Wife Had Told Him of an As ault and he started Out

New York, Feb. 4.—Rev. John Keller, secretary to Rt. Rev. Bishop Starkey, pastor of Trimity Episcopal mission, in Arlington, N. J., and chaplain of the 1st New Jersey regiment, was shot and seriously wounded by Thos. G. Birker, in Arlington, yesterday morning.

Mr. Keller had just left the house of John S. Sands, where he had his meals, when Barker, who was in front of the door, opened fire. One bullet went through the facial bone, from the right side, and destroyed the sight of the right eye. Another bullet shattered the fingers of the right hand, and another passed through the clergyman's hat. The fourth went wide of its mark.

The shooting, it is said, was the re-The shooting, it is said, was the result of a disclosure made by Barker's wife, although Keller denies the accusation made against him. Barker, after the shooting, surrendered to the police, and was locked up. He will have a hearing to-morrow morning. Keller was carried into the Sands home, where the doctors said he had an even chance for life. Keller said after the shooting that he did not know who shot him. He refused to sign a complaint. sign a complaint.

According to a story told by Barker to several friends after the shooting, his wife the night previous told him, that the illness from which she had suffered for nearly a year and which caused the Barkers to break up their home and go to boarding was due to an assault committed on her at her home by Rev. Mr. Keller. The as-sault, it is alleged, was committed af-ter a hard struggle, during which ter a hard struggle, during which Mrs, Birker became unconscious. The Birkers and the minister were very friendly and had continued apparently friendly. Mrs. Birker was a member of the mission, but her husband was not. When Birker heard his wife's story he waited until morning and then lay in wait for the minister and shot him.

The ammonia was extraordinarily strong, but the policeman held it close to the man's nostrils without drawing from him any more forcible sign of dismfort than a slight sniffing and turn ing of the head.

"That's a pretty example," said one of the men who was waiting, bare armed, to have himself scratched, "of he comparative inability of a man to stand physical pain. The man had, indeed, fainted away.

Many persons, particularly those of high strung organisms, are thus affected by pain in a way altogether incommensurate with the actual "hurt." A bump on the head, a squeezing of a finger in a door, causes a nervous reaction which makes them faint or even takes away consciousness for a

"People of this sort," said the do tor in the vaccination office, "are made faint oftentimes purely through their imagination. They can't control it. Involuntarily, even though they have the 'will' to go through an ordeal, their nervous system reacts against it, and they faint away. A patient, for in-stance, may faint the first time a bit of cotton soaked in an antiseptic wash is thrust up his nose. The operation doesn't really 'hurr' at all, but the feeling is a new, unpleasant and curious one. Without shrinking from it at all, the patient finds himself suddealy growing faint. His high strung nervous system has involuntarily re-

"In these vaccination faintings, however, a slow circulation or a tendency to vertigo that in ordinary conditions would not be noticed may be the cause I have had big policemen, apparently in the tip of good health and without a nerve in their bodies, so to speak, topple over at the first scratch of the needle."
