A MATCH TRICK.

Good Many People in England Are Puzzled Over It. ERE is a match trick which just now is puzzling a good many people in England. "A" says to "B": Here are twenty-five matches. Now let each of us matches. Now let each of us take away, in rotation, not more than three at a time. You may begin. Whoever gets the last match loses."

"All right," says "B," I'll begin." 'And now they take them away as ollows:

"A" 3 1 2 1 1 2
This makes twenty-four, so that the ast match falls to "B." seen that "A" each time takes away a number of matches which, added to those taken by "B," makes four, and as twenty-five is one in excess of a multiple of four 'B" cannot help losing. But the latter does not know it, glays again, loses again, and makes "A" begin.

"A" begins:

"A" 3 2 3 2 1 3 "B" 7 3 1 2 3 1
This makes twenty-four, and "B" foses. "A" simply operates so that as scon as possible the number of maiches from which "B" has to take shows one in addition to a multiple of four, and from then on again takes away a number, which, added to those taken by "B," makes four. Of course, the total number of matches is not restricted to twenty-five. It may be 29, 37, 73, 101, etc., but must always be one in excess of a multiple of four.

Birds Intelligence. During the early part of the summer of 1835, a pair of water-hens built their nest by the margin of the ornamental pond at Bell's Hill, a piece of water of considerable extent, and ordinarily fed by a spring from the height above, but into which the contents of another large pond can occassionally be admitted.

This was done while the female was sitting; and as the nest had been built when the water level stood low, the sudden influx of this large body of water from the second pond caused a rise of several inches, so as to threaten the speedy immersion and consequent destruction of the eggs. This the birds seem to have been aware of, and they immediately took precausions against so imminent a danger; for when the gardener, seeing the sudden rise of the water, went to look after the nest, expecting to find it covered and the eggs destroyed, or at least forsaken by the hen, he observed, while at a distance, both birds busily engaged about the brink where the nest was placed; and when near enough he clearly perceived that they were adding, with all possible dispatch, fresh materials to raise the fabric beyond the level of the increased contents of the pond; and that the eggs had by some means been removed from the nest by the birds, and were then lying upon the grass about a foot or more

from the margin of the water. He watched them for some time, and saw the nest rapidly increase in height; but I regret to add that he did not remain long enough, fearing he might create alarm, to witness the interesting act of replacing the eggs, which must have been effected shortly after; for, upon his return in less than an hour, he found the hen quietly sitting upon them in the newly raised


