

SEVEN PERISH IN N.Y. FIRE.

Mereism of Firemen and Police Lessened Death Roll Greatly.

New York, Sept. 14.—Seven persons in one family were burned to death and six others were injured seriously, in a fire which partially destroyed a tenement building at Nos. 68-70 First street, early yesterday. More than twenty families were asleep in the building. Women and children were being dropped from the windows of the lower floors, and dozens of grown persons were fighting in the hallways to reach the open air when the firemen arrived.

A policeman clambered to the roof of an adjoining building and by clinging to the cornice, with the smoke pouring in his face, reached down to the window of the fifth floor and raised seven children who were handed out by their parents.

Another officer, winding a coat about his head, entered the building from below and rolled down the stairs the body of a half suffocated man. Three times the officer came back from within carrying two persons in his arms. Then he fell. ex-

man. Three times the officer came back from within carrying two persons in his arms. Then he fell, exhausted.

Meantime ladders were run to the top of the building, and firemen rescued at least twenty tenement dwellers who were about to jump. One fireman, although badly burned, took seven persons from a single window on the fourth floor. It is believed the fire was of incendiary origin.

Killed By a Train.

St. Thomas, Sept. 14.—A fatal accident occurred on the Michigan Central Railway at St. Clair Junction about noon yesterday. No. 32 express, Engineer Vail, Conductor Mann, struck Frank Styles, a lad of 13 years, whose father lives at the north branch of the Talbot road, and instantly killed him. The lad had slipped off the track and got out of the way of a westbound train and also got out of the way of No. 32 express, but he stepped back on the track and was struck by the engine. track and was struck by the engine.

Run Over at Hamilton. Hamilton, Sept. 14.-An unknown man was run over at 1.50 this morning by a yard engine in the Stewart street yards of the G.T.R. Both legs were run over, one was severed at the knee and the other was crushed. He was taken to the hospital in the ambulance, but the doctors say that he cannot live. He is said to be an employe of the rolling mills, but the authorities have been unable to discover his name.

Killed By Live Wire.

To Distribute \$31.000,000.

Montreal, Sept. 14.—The sum of \$31,000,000 is to be distributed to Cuban war veterans by means of the Royal Bank of Canada, through its various branches in Cuba. This money is due in connection with the war of 1898 between Spain and the United States. This payment, which, upon the formation of the republic, became one of its first obligations, was met by a loan of \$35,000,000, the met by a loan of \$35,000,000, the same being placed in New York and other cities. The Royal Bank will pay the sum in instalments of \$10,000,000 per month. The work entailed in disbursing \$31,000,000 in so short a time, will naturally be a strain upon the various staffs of the Royal Bank now located in Cuba, and to meet the emergency a number of Canadian officers will be detailed to assist.

General Manager Hays at Victoria, Victoria, B. C., Sept. 14.—The G. T. P. party has returned from their inspection of the terminal facilities. President Hays made a general in-President Hays made a general inspection of the coast line from the Alaskan boundary line to Bute Inlet.
