THE COUNCIL MEETING.

The City Council established a commendable precedent at their meeting last Monday evening, when they refused to re-open the Joseph street pavement matter, after it had once been settled to the satisfaction of the majority of the residents on the street.

In times gone past the aldermen have been put to no end of trouble, through pavement contractors and promoters, with their petitions, counter petitions, withdrawals, etc., until they look for trouble whenever they hear of a new pavement being promoted. When the original Joseph street petition came in, it was commented upon as being the cleanest and most unanimous petition ever presented at the board, and it was thought so much of, that the by-law was immediately "put through."

The Council, therefore, deserve credit for unanimously refusing to grant the request of a few agitators on the street who wished to re-open the matter for the consideration of another petition which would only cause delays and wrangling. If the request had been granted, the work on the pavement might not have been started this summer. As it is, the construction will commence just as soon as the weather will permit, and the residents on that street will have a pavement this year, laid on a concrete base, the only kind of a foundation which should be used in the construction of pavements in Chatham.

It is with a certain degree of satisfaction that The Planet notes the fact that the Council have directed an inspection of the market building, and will receive a report, from an expert, on the condition of the building before they accept the work. This is indeed a wise proceeding, in view of the fact that so many complaints have been recorded in connection with this structure. Ald. Scullard himself, at the meeting, backed up the statements made by him, and reported in The Planet, that he did not consider the building fit to be accepted.

Nothing should be left undone in safeguarding the city's interests, and in seeing that the citizens receive full value for the money they expend in public works. The matter of the investigation is safe in the hands of Ald. Potter and the other members of the Property committee, who will see that written statements are obtained from the architect and contractor, before the final accounts are settled.

The Council made no mistake when they decided to request Mr. H. S. Clements, M. P., to represent the city at the Convention at Ottawa, which has been called for the purpose of considering the question of tuberculosis. Mr. Clements is one of the most active men at Ottawa to-day, and he has established a reputation on both sides of the House of "looking after his constituency." The Council and the citizens generally may rest assured that their interests are safe in the hands of Mr. Clements, and if there is any possible chance to find a Sanitarium in Western Ontario, the vigilant member for West Kent will assuredly find it out, and will sustain his well earned reputation for "getting things."

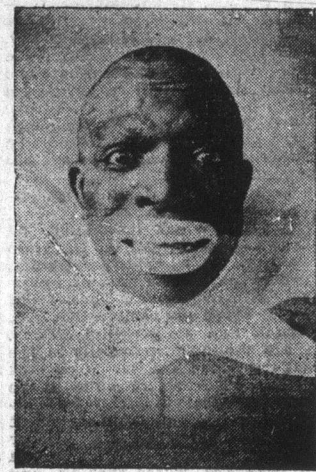
