Town Council Meeting.
The regular monthly meeting of the town Council was held on Wednesday evening. Present, Mayor, Recorder, and Councillors Black, Tingley, Lawrence, Fitch, Duncanson, Wallace. Reports were given by the various committees.

A communication from the secretary of the Board of Underwriters, Halifax, stated that they could give no authority for the report that had come to them that the Wolfville town water had been shut off for two days.

The Health officer presented his quarterly report, in which he stated that the railway station had been put in a sanitary condition with the promise that there would be no future cause of complaint. He regretted that the man-holes in Main street were still open. He also called attention to the fact that many householders have not yet connected their water system with the sewer system.

Willow Bank Cemetery.
In a recent number of THE ACADIAN enquiry was made by a subscriber as to the conditions under which the above named property was acquired. The following, which is a copy of the minutes of the first meeting held in connection with the cemetery, will be of general interest in this connection, especially to those who have in late years become residents of the town:

WOLFVILLE, Feb 14th 1880
Pursuant to a resolution signed by J. W. Bigelow, Esq., the principal inhabitants of Wolfville and vicinity assembled in Borden's Hall this evening to make provision for repairing the old burying ground and providing a new one for the section.

Hon. J. S. McDonald was appointed chairman and Mr Albert Caldwell secretary.

Mr Bigelow, being called upon, stated briefly the object of the meeting, and called upon J. W. Bars, Esq., to give his views on the cemetery question.

Mr Bars in response, stated that the subject had been upon his mind for several years, that he had examined several sites and had finally purchased from Mr Thomas L. DeWolf nine acres of land at a cost of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450.00).

This land he offered to donate to the community embraced in Ward No. 10, on condition that it be properly fenced, ornamented and laid out in lots.

In response to this very generous proposition the Rev. Dr. Sawyer moved the following resolution:

Resolved that we hereby express our sincere thanks to J. W. Bars, Esq., for his munificent offer of a suitable piece of land for a Cemetery for the use of this community, and we trust that suitable measures will be adopted whereby the conditions of this offer may be fairly met, so that this community may at an early day have the benefit which Mr Bars has so generously designed for us.

This was seconded by Mr James Elder and spoken to by the mover, the second, the Rev. S. W. DeBolis, the Rev. Thomas Rogers, and J. A. Halliday, and J. W. Hamilton, Esq., and on being put passed unanimously.

The Chairman then tendered the thanks of the meeting to Mr Bars, to which the latter briefly responded.

It was then moved by J. W. Bars, Esq., seconded by the Rev Mr Rogers and Resolved "That J. W. Bigelow, John L. Brown, James W. Caldwell, Angus S. Murray, James Elder, James S. Morse, John W. Wallace, William Woodman, J. B. Davison, A. DeW. Bars, M.D., and J. W. Hamilton, Esq., be a board of trustees to receive and manage said Cemetery, and apply to the Legislature at its approaching session for an act of Incorporation.

Mr Bigelow responded on behalf of the newly appointed Trustees and in the course of his address referred to the old burying ground. He stated that he had made a careful estimate of the amount required to fence properly the old Cemetery, and judged that it would be five hundred dollars. Of this sum he was prepared to contribute one fourth provided the rest was raised.
