District Court Last Thursday

District Court concluded here Thursday afternoon. His Honor Judge Jackson presiding. In the case of E. J. Ivins vs Dr. W. S. Pickup, plaintiff sued for \$96.50 for board and lodging of a patient of the defendant. The defence was to the effect that he was not liable for the bill and that any liability he might have had was settled by paying plaintiff's wife for caring for the patient. Judgment against defendant for \$5.00, no costs. Z. W. Jacobs for the plaintiff, and Wm. Laurie for the defendant.

In the case of Stubbs vs. Criss plaintiff sued for \$75.00 price of paint, sold defendant counter-claimed for \$31.50 price of lumber delivered. Judgment for plaintiff with costs, counterclaim dismissed. Jacobs for plaintiff, defendant in person.

Z. W. Jacobs vs. Oishaski for \$15.05. Judgment for \$12.00 and costs. S. H. Nelson for plaintiff and Laurie for defendant.

J. S. Sloan vs. W. J. McKee. Claim for pasture bill of \$135.00. Defence—that pasture bill was excessive, and counterclaim for injury to pony of defendant wrongfully use for loss of cow which strayed from plaintiff's premises, and for wrongfully holding defendant's horse. Plaintiff recovered \$90.00 and defendant \$40.00 on counterclaim. Jacobs for Plaintiff and Laurie and Nelson for defendant.

Rex vs. J. Ivey. Appeal under Indian Act for sale of Lemon extracts to Indians, adjourned to May 5th. on account of Appellant's illness.
