Guelph Township Board of Health.

A meeting of this Board was held at the (American) Hotel, on Saturday, 27th June, in response to a call from the chairman in accordance with adjournment at last meeting. George A. Parby in the chair. Members present, Messrs. H. Watson and Wm. Whiteley. The minutes of last meeting were confirmed. The chairman stated his object in calling the present meeting was for the purpose of consulting the members of the Board of the advisability of arranging with Adjutant Clarke, Sanitary Inspector of the City of Guelph, to act in the same capacity for the township. Mr. Clarke was present and signified his acceptance of the appointment. It was then moved by Mr. Whiteley, seconded by Mr. Watson, that the chairman of this Board be authorized to employ Walter Clarke, Sanitary Inspector of the City of Guelph, to act in the same capacity for the township by any party or parties, and the chairman be authorized to carry out any report made by the said Mr. Clarke. Carried. The Board then adjourned to meet subject to a call from the chairman.

Cracow, July 1.—General Gourko's report to the Czar on the condition of Poland is disappointing. He says that all classes of society are animated with patriotic feelings. He advises the abolition of the Polish bank and the Polish theatre at Warsaw.

How China Protects Herself.

St. Petersburg, July 1.—A despatch from Biagowichensk says a fresh trouble has occurred on the Chinese frontier. The Chinese Government sent a detachment of soldiers to protect the Aigun gold fields from an invasion by unauthorized parties. The troops were instructed to defend all persons found engaged in mining, and not having the necessary permit, and the Russian Government prohibits its subjects from mining the Aigun gold fields.

Three young men of Port Perry, named Thomas McEwen, Isaac Vipond, and Martin Hardie, all of Brooklin, were out on Lake Scugog this morning in a small boat. When near Scugog Island, about three-quarters of a mile from here, one of them made a mistake of the oar and the boat capsized. Vipond and McEwen clung to the boat and drifted ashore. Hardie, being unable to swim, was drowned. The body has not yet been recovered.

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THE SPORTING FIELD

Three Victories for Guelph Clubs Yesterday.

Base Ball. There were fully a thousand people present to witness the game between the Maple Leafs and Primroses of Hamilton on the base ball grounds yesterday, notwithstanding the other attractions, chief of which was the Caledonian games, being held in the city. Owing to the late hour of the match, four o'clock, many of those who had been awaiting themselves otherwise found it convenient to repair to the grounds. The interest in the game was probably heightened from the rumour that was current that a "dark horse" was to pitch for the home team. It was close on to five o'clock before the game was commenced on account of the Primroses being late to the city. The Guelph men went to bat, Maddock securing his base on balls, but was left on third. Smith and Purvis being put out on first. The Leafs then took the field, and as the "dark horse"—Billy Smith—scored three runs for the Leafs, and being out of practice it was a surprise to many that his pitching was so effective as it proved. With the exception of the first, his pitching was remarkably good, and he took care to make no costly errors at critical stages of the game. Bierbaum was first to bat, and made a ground, getting first on an error to Maddock, a base hit followed and two wild pitches and a wild throw by Smith scored three runs for the Leafs. On the next innings the Primroses made nothing, and base hits by Dyson, Wright and Bierbaum tied the score, when the Leafs, in the game, which had somewhat flagged, was revived, and the Leafs were again cheered on their success, and enthusiastically when they secured a run ahead on the 6th and 7th innings. The Primroses also secured one on the fifth and another on the 7th. On the eighth no runs were made, Sharp doing some fine fielding. On the opening of the 9th every one seemed to be "enthralled" and anxious as to the final result. Cook, man was struck out and things looked blue, but a base hit by Maddock, a two runner on the part of the Primroses, added two more runs to the score of the Leafs. Only one man of the Primroses got his base, thus leaving the score 8 to 5 in favor of the home team. The fielding of Kirkland and Cook was admirable, and so was the batting of Bierbaum, who made third base and gained second twice by hard batting. The heavy hitting of the Leafs was remarkable, although they seemed to have hard luck in the field. The game on the whole was a very interesting one, but was loosely played in several instances.
