

The three cars that remained on the track were the dining car and the provision cars. There was a strong wind with snow. A biting cold caused suffering to the wounded but help soon came and the wounded were placed inside what remained of the cars that were not smashed. All the boys that were uninjured took a hand in helping out the injured, and soon with the debris of the wrecked coaches, a number of open fires were roaring, bringing comfort to the men. A relief train came out from Edmunston and after its arrival, all worry and discomfort disappeared.
