Pit offerings were very light, causing tightness, there being a good demand for shippers for November. There was considerable hedging, sales being transferred from November to December and May. Cash demand was fair to indifferent. Some new export business was reported, with offerings on a more liberal scale. Oats values showed little change, fluctuating about 1c in sympathy with wheat. There was a good cash demand for all grades, with increased offerings. Barley and flax offerings were fair, demand was indifferent. Wheat closed 3%c higher to unchanged; oats 1c to 1%c higher; barley 1c lower to 11/4c higher; flax 11/2 lower to %c higher, and rye 5c
