6 inch main Dominion St. to Woodman Ave., 366 feet; 6 inch main Yull Street to Woodman Ave., 200 feet; 6 inch main Queen Street to Road Allowance, 900 feet; 6 inch main East Road Allowance to South Railway Street, 200 feet; 6 inch main Factory Street to Columbia Avenue, 256 feet; 6 inch main King Street to Columbia Avenue, 100 feet; 6 inch main Bay Street from 4th to 5th Avenue, 930 feet; 6 inch main from 4th Avenue westerly, 475 feet; 8 inch main Ottawa Street 7th to 8th Ave., 350 feet; 8 inch main Montreal St. from stand pipe to 8th Ave., 460 ft.; 8 inch main 8th Ave., Montreal to Beaumar Street, 670 feet; 8 inch main Beaumar Street, 7th to 8th Avenue, 355 feet.

Before the end of the year, Alderman Huckvale stated, the appropriation for waterworks would be somewhat exceeded, but this would not have been the case but for the trouble experienced during the summer with the flood and the trouble with the old steam pumps.

Streets graded—Toronto Street between 8th Avenue and Road Allowance; Macleod Trail between Montreal St and 8th Ave.; Balmoral St. from Road Allowance to Washington Avenue; lane between Montreal and Toronto Street, 2nd to 1st Ave.; Toronto Street between 4th and 5th Avenue; Montreal Street from South Railway Street to 4th Avenue; S. Railway Street from Montreal to Main Street.

Ditching—South Railway St. from Montreal to River Street; Montreal Street from 5th Ave. to South Railway Street.

Culverts—12 new culverts put in and 16 old ones repaired.

Street gravelled—South Railway from Main to Montreal; Toronto St. from 4th to 5th Ave.; Columbia Avenue from Park to King Sts.

Holes in streets caused by floods—A great many holes in the streets were filled in and the streets put in good shape.

Sidewalks gravelled—Road Allowance east side from Dominion Street to Montreal Street; Bowdoin, north side, from 6th Ave. westerly to 5th Ave.; Main St. from Road Allowance, north side; Main St. south side from 1st to 2nd Ave.

Ald. Spencer, chairman of the Finance and Police Committee, introduced his report by a very complimentary reference to the efficiency of the city's police force. No radical changes had taken place in the department during the year with the exception of the appointment of a Police Magistrate.

Ald. Spencer pointed out that out of this total expenditure of \$10,786, all that had been drawn by the boys themselves had been \$544.78. Considering the efficiency of the Brigade the cost could not be considered as excessive. Taking everything into consideration the Fire Department was one of which the city should be proud, and although some of the demands made by the boys were somewhat insistent, on the whole it was in the best interests of the city that these demands for extra equipment be granted. The Brigade had taken a determined stand on the question of having the pound removed from its location beneath the fire hall windows and had driven the Council to action, which was a very good thing, as the centre of the city was no place for such an unsanitary institution.
