The supply of maize for the week was 1,160,000 to 1,200,000 bush, v. an average weekly consumption in 1877 of 1,261,124 bush, v. 1,890,774 bush in 1876, and 773,853 bush in 1875. From harvest to the 7th inst. the sales in the 150 prin cipal markets have been 2,185,214 quarters, against 1,689,228 quarters last year, and it is computed that in the whole kingdom they have been 8,740,000 quarters, against 6,765,000 quarters in the corres-ponding period of last season. The average price for the season up to the above date was 40s 6d per quarter against 51s 2d last year. The quantity of wheat and flour on transit for the United Kingdom on the 19th inst. showed a decrease of 50,000 quarters on the week, and amounted to 1,400,000 PROVISIONS. quarters, against 1,573,000 on the 5th inst., and 1,302,000 at the corresponding date last year. The quantity of wheat due at the ports of call in the TRADE-Seems to have been fairly steady dur the week.

Continental advices to the 9th inst. report an un favourable change in the weather in France causing renewed apprehensions as to the safety of the growing crops. Offerings of wheat in the depart-mental markets were small, but apparently sufficient as large imports from Russia and from this side were expected. Prices consequently showed little change; a slight advance was quoted in 11 and a

fall in 22 out of 93 markets whence reports had been received. At Paris there was no change on spot wheat but the term market showed an advance: flour was unsettled at the same place during the week but closed quiet and steady. At Marseilles imports of wheat for the week ending on the 31st ult. were 70,000 quarters,

but an active demand had reduced stocks in the docks to 77,000 quarters. Large imports were expected. Germany has been blessed with a week of fine growing weather; a warm temperature and light showers had worked a considerable improvement in the growing crops, and all cereals, save rye, were progressing favourably. Wheat was considerably easier at Berlin; and dull foreign advices had somewhat depressed the trade. At Hamburg the market was quiet in consequence of in- 84c for green ; at 94c for smoked, and 10c for cancreased offers of wheat from Baltic ports ; but prices showed no quotable decline.
