A Breeze In Council

To the Editor of the Advocate Sir:

In the Official Report of the late Session of the County Council published in the Chatham "World" there is a statement not quite correct. When the Warden expressed the opinion that I was out of order, and I appealed to the Council, the Report states the Council sustained the view of the Chair. That statement is not correct. The Warden did not put the question to the Council to see whether he would be sustained or not. The Warden only expressed his opinion mildly on a point of Order.

Why was it supposed I was out of Order? Because I elected to explain before reading a Resolution I was about to offer. Now there is nothing in the Rules of Order to preclude a Member, offering a Resolution, from remarking upon it before he reads it. He may explain its aim and object either before he reads it or after. That is at his own option. The better way however is to explain it in advance so that when read it may be better understood. This according to Parliamentary usage is quite in order. Every man who makes a motion speaks about its object in advance. A Resolution is only a motion more clearly defined by being reduced to writing.

If it were thought my remarks were too lengthy, that notion—were it correct—furnished no ground for holding me to be out of Order, for there is nothing in the rules of Order providing a time limit.

During the short time I occupied the floor as was my right, one of two members got badly out of Order. One Councillor so far forgot to respect himself, the company he was in, the Rules of Order, and the traditional dignity of the Council Chamber, as to make a gross and abusive exhibition of his coarseness. In all such cases the Rules of Order require the Warden to call the offender to order, and as he did not do so, he himself was out of Order and remiss in his duty.

Southwest Councillors never engage in personal abuse, and never reply to it in kind, because they understand it is a field in which there are no laurels to be won. They know too, that personal abuse is the weapon, only of the coward and the vanquished. Councillor Watling ought to be old enough to realize these things. Blissfield Councillors usually sit silent, when they do rise, they do not ask the privilege as a favor, they demand it as their right. And while not inclined to demand more than their rights, they are by no means disposed to accept less. In offering my Resolution and remarks I was perfectly in Order in every respect. While not wishing to impute a wrong motive, or to say an uncharitable word, I must still submit, that sometimes, those who can neither answer, nor abide an unpalatable truth, may prefer to choke it off. My Resolution was adopted by a large majority.
