We learn from the Chronicle that quite a number of the Clergymen of the Methodist Church left the Plover at Bonavista for the purpose of attending District Meeting.

Having been passenger in the Plover from Little Bay (says the Chronicle) to St. John's, the writer is enabled to give a correct statement of the condition of affairs from Cape Bonavista to Cape John.

CODFISH.—With the exception of a fair sign about King's Cove, most of which is of a very small run, there has yet been nothing done North. On Saturday week last we saw four quintals of medium size fish on Mr Elward's stage in Stock Cove, caught on herring bait. Unfortunately but two or three had bait, and those without it did nothing. We are justified in saying that the catch of fish North of Cape Bonavista at this date does not amount to one tenth of the quantity on shore at the same date last year.

Salmon is being taken in some localities, but in no case does the take in any locality reach that of last season. Caplin have struck in in Green Bay but bring no improvement of the Cod-fishery, as might be anticipated.

Although the outlook as we have given it is gloomy enough, there is a small bit of copper lining to the cloud in the mining work being done in Notre Dame Bay. Tilt Cove operations have been suspended during a few months, but there is promise of an early and vigorous renewal. Betts Cove is driving business to advantage, and has suffered nothing by the falling in account referred to a short time since.

Nippers Harbor is a hive of busy flies, and Little Bay responds vigorously to their hum. A steamer of 1400 tons left Little Bay on Friday last with one of first-class quality. The village is one of the prettiest spots we have seen for many a year, particularly on 'the Park' side; but it might have been better if the streets had been given more width, and if the Water street residents were placed some eighty feet further back. Perhaps, however, the errors of the present, in this respect, are but temporary. The Church is a nice building externally and nicely situated. The school-house, however, is neither the one nor the other. The lady who has charge of this important department of the work of Little Bay does us something better than a badly fitted fish left in which to train the healthy looking youngsters who, to the number of about forty, daily gather a good deal more than elementary knowledge from her teachings.

The mine at Locks Harbor, under charge of Captain Pill, is progressing, and is evidently costing some money.
