A Tribute to Irish Faith.

At the opening of the Church of the Immaculate Conception, in Charlottetown, on the evening of the 7th inst., the Rev. Fr. O'Connell, D.D., of the diocese of Montreal, was invited to preach the opening sermon. He spoke on the subject of "The Irish Faith," and his address was a most impressive and inspiring one.

He spoke of the trials and tribulations of our people, and of the steadfast faith which has sustained them through all these years. He spoke of the love of our country, and of the pride which we should feel in our Irish heritage.

He spoke of the sacrifices of our fathers, and of the duty which we owe to them. He spoke of the hope which we should have for the future, and of the confidence which we should have in our God and our country.

His words were full of truth and inspiration, and they were received with the greatest interest and attention by the large congregation which had gathered to hear him.

The Rev. Fr. O'Connell's address was a most timely one, and it was a great blessing to our people. We hope that it will be remembered long and with gratitude.

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Testimony to the Confessional.

At a recent conference of ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States, the subject of "Confession" was introduced, when a number of those present spoke in favor of the practice, and their words seemed to meet with the favor of a majority of the conference.

The Rev. Edward Osborne, of Boston, better known as "Father Osborne," who has officiated both in Charlottetown and Summerside, argued on the affirmative side, with all the logic and earnestness that any Priest of the Catholic Church could exhibit.

He represented, in glowing terms, the elevating and restraining power of Confession, and the efficacy of the sacrament of penance. He said that it was a most precious and necessary part of our religious life.

He spoke of the love of God, and of the love of our neighbor. He spoke of the hope which we should have for the future, and of the confidence which we should have in our God and our country.
